May our time together, our worship and learning, impact our congregations and our communities as God's Kingdom, his will, is done in our hearts, lives, and ministries!


Bishop's Top Ten Prayer € Praise List



A Jesus Shaped Life: Discipleship and Mission for everyday people by **Bob Rognlien**




Building a Discipling Culture: How to release a missional movement by discipling people like Jesus did by Mike Breen and the 3DM Team

W. Joel Copeland, Jr.

In 1985 Joel began his service as a VA Chaplain by serving as a contract Chaplain at Batavia, NY V.A. Medical Center where he served until 1988 under endorsement by the Wesleyan Church.

Joel joined our denomination in 1988 and was assigned to pastor Myerstown EC Church for 7 years. He then pastured Rexmont EC Church part-time for 3 years. He and his family are still associated with the Rexmont church.

While he was at Rexmont the Evangelical Congregational Church endorsed him to serve as a fee base Chaplain at the Coatesville VA Medical Center in May, 1996. The next March he was endorsed as a full time Veterans Affairs Chaplain in Coatesville and served on the staff of 5. While there he achieved Board Certified Chaplain status in Feb. 2004 and the next year he was granted a Competency in Hospice and Palliative Care. In Feb. 2008 he applied to be assigned to the Lebanon PA V.A. Medical Center as a Clinical Staff Chaplain. In May 2012, Joel was promoted to become the Chief of Chaplaincy Service at Lebanon V.A. Medical Center, and he has served in the position until the present and his retirement from the Chaplaincy on May 31, 2017, with 20 years of service to the VA endorsed by the Evangelical Congregational Church.

We are grateful for Joel's faithful service over the years to our denomination and to the veterans and the staff members of the V.A. Medical Centers where he served.

Financial Solutions for Pastors and Churches

The majority of pastors faith-fully serve in small congregations with financial challenges. Others serve in churches with larger budgets and salaries. Regardless of what a pastor's personal and church income looks like, all can benefit from discovering the best financial practices for their home and church. The NAE Financial Health project launched a website to help pastor do just that.

NAEfinancialhealth.org offers self-assessment surveys where pastors can learn their Financial Health Score and discover action steps for improvement in different areas of financial health. The site also brings together a vast collection of Best Practices resources from financial health experts. Pastors and their spouses—or pastors and church leadership teams—can also sign up for online training in which they meet



once a month and work together on shared goals.

The NAE began planning for the project in 2015 with surveys of pastors and denominational leaders, a consultation of church leaders and an initial assessment of existing financial resources designed for pastors. The NAE is also partnering with a small group of NAE member denominations to offer matching grants to pastors with financial needs.



ing wrong with being clever. Let's choose, however, to be clever after we get up from our prayer time.

Les Cool for the Kingdom Extension Community



In the classic horror novel Frankenstein, author Mary Shelley tells the story of a man so driven with grief at the loss of a loved one the he tries to recreate life artificially. The result, a creature cobbled together with the parts of various human bodies, is brought to life from a bolt of lightning, but is a hideous creature that his creator sees as a monster. The book ends with creature and creator pursuing each other to their deaths.

Sometimes I wonder if we don't use the Dr. Frankenstein method to try to bring new life to our struggling or dying churches. We try new programs, we add (or subtract) praise choruses for hymns, we take out the pews for more com-



fortable seating, we get rid of the organ and have a praise band, etc. In other words, we try all sorts of artificial means to breathe new life into our church body. Please don't misunderstand me; there is nothing wrong with these methods in and of themselves. But it's unlikely that they will rejuvenate a church if there is no desire to change and grow. If you'll forgive the mixed religious metaphor, sometimes we

use these ideas as a Hail Mary pass. (If you don't understand that reference, just ask any football fan.)

In Ezekiel 37, the prophet writes that the Lord took him into a valley of dry bones and told him to prophesy to them. In verses 7-8, Ezekiel says, "...And as I was prophesying, there was a noise, a rattling sound and the bones came together, bone to bone. I looked, and tendons and flesh appeared on them and skin covered them, but there was no breath in them." He continues in verse 9 "This is what the Sovereign Lord says: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe into these slain, that they may live." (NIV)

Just as when Ezekiel stood in the valley of the dry bones, there is no life until the Spirit of the Lord breathes into the body. My adult Sunday School has begun a study on the Holy Spirit, and all of us in the class have been struck by how most of our evangelical churches do not put any emphasis on this person of the Trinity. Yet Jesus told his disciples that it was better for him to go, so the Counselor could come.

News from the Executive Director:

I am glad to see reimbursements from the HRA are trending upward. Funds are available to reimburse for covered health care expenses above the annual out of pocket limit of \$500, excluding co-pays, is available through the HRA. The HRA will reimburse for out of pocket prescription cost above \$1,800/yr and therapy co-pay visits (occupational, physical, speech and respiratory therapy) above \$1,800/yr. Instructions and forms for HRA reimbursements are available on the website or call Dave King or Kevin Henry at the Church Center and we will walk you through the HRA reimbursement process.

If your church is changing pastors on July 1 please be aware that benefit payments may change, e.g. health insurance and pension. Every year there is at least one change in health insurance coverage at a church that is a surprise to us. Pastors and their families are not covered by our health insurance plan until a Capital Blue Cross application is completed, submitted and accepted for processing. Please remind a new pastor joining our health insurance plan to contact Dave King for a Capital Blue Cross and Prime Pay applications. Pastors must also complete a form to cancel their health insurance. The application to join the plan and the insurance cancellation form requires the pastor's signature to be valid. A church will continue to be billed for health insurance until the cancellation form is processed.

Worker's Compensation: Thank you to all that have timely paid the worker's compensation invoices. For those that haven't the due date was May 15. Payment for the Disability and Benefit Corp Services fee were due January 15 and April 15 respectively, both fees are listed on the 2017 Treasurer's Guide available on www.eccenter.com.
