I, as bishop, arrived on Tuesday to take some time reviewing the preparations, get all of my materials ready for the week’s sessions, and to spend some time in prayer for the events which would soon be taking place in the Brubaker Auditorium. The good news is that National Conference went well; the times of worship were outstanding, the Kingdom & Community Experience provided a great opportunity to talk together about being “ALL IN” for Jesus, and even the business sessions went smoothly. Thank you all for praying! Our heavenly Father answered your prayers in amazing ways.

You have a body.” Yet how many of us, particularly in vocational ministry are so focused on taking care of everyone else that we neglect to take care of our own hearts? These same three things can and should equally apply to every local congregational leader.

I’m not going to tell you where those boundaries are, I am a fellow sufferer. But I am thankful that for at least one night I was able to figure it out and enjoy a good old fashioned Little League game under a bright blue sky over green grass and a real dirt infield. Eventually, I hope to get better at the vacation thing and maybe even attempt the sabbatical thing. Maybe not today; but it’s a goal and goals are good to have. For now I’ll enjoy the memory of a really nice evening away from adult responsibilities and watching kids play a wonderful game; win or lose.



News from the Executive Director

Disbursements from the Health reimbursement Account are available for any pastor on the Capital Blue Cross plan unfortunately the disbursements are about the same as previous years. Funds are available to reimburse for covered health care expenses above the annual out of pocket limit of \$500, excluding co-pays, through the HRA. The HRA will reimburse for out of pocket prescription drug cost above \$1,800/yr and therapy co-pay visits (occupational, physical, speech and respiratory therapy) above \$1,800/yr. Instructions and forms for HRA reimbursements are available on the website or call Dave King or Kevin Henry at the Church Center and we will walk you through the HRA reimbursement process.

If your church is changing pastors on July 1, please be aware that benefit payments may change, e.g. health insurance and pension. Every year there is at least one change in health insurance coverage at a church that is a surprise to us. Pastors and their families are not covered by our health insurance plan until a Capital Blue Cross application is completed, submitted and accepted for processing. Please remind a new pastor joining our health insurance plan to contact Dave King for Capital Blue Cross and Prime Pay applications. Pastors must also complete a form to cancel their health insurance. The application to join the plan and the insurance cancellation form requires the pastor's signature to be valid. A church will continue to be billed for health insurance until the cancellation form is processed.

Workers Compensation: Thank you to all that have timely paid the worker's compensation invoices. For those that haven't the due date was May 15. Payment for the Disability and Benefit Corp Services fee were due January 15 and April 15 respectively, both fees are listed on the 2018 Treasurer's Guide available on www.eccenter.com.

Painting of Local revolutionary War Officer Unveiled at StoneRidge Poplar Run

On Thursday, May 17, amidst patriotic music and a small gathering of onlookers, an oil painting of Colonel Joseph Wood (1723-1788), a Revolutionary War officer, was unveiled in the Meier Room at StoneRidge Poplar Run* in Myerstown. Colonel Wood first served as a soldier in the French and Indian War and later as a commander of the 3rd Pennsylvania Regiment during the American Revolution. The framed, 40"x32" oil painting, commissioned in 1987 by Dr. George D. Heiss, a fourth great-grandson of Col. Wood, was painted by New Jersey portrait artist Jason Woodruff. The painting is owned by the Isaac Meier Society, a 501©, non-profit organization established to restore and preserve the Isaac Meier Homestead.

Col. Wood's son married one of Isaac Meier's daughters. In 1768, Isaac Meier laid out lots for a town called "Tulpehockentown", later Myerstown, currently celebrating its 250th anniversary with events planned throughout the year. The Isaac Meier Society has given the painting on permanent loan to StoneRidge Poplar Run where it will be exhibited in the Meier Room, a fine dining venue at Poplar Run. Also at the unveiling was a copy of a letter dated December 14, 1776 written in Wood's own hand when he was a commander at Fort Ticonderoga in New York. National Conference 2018 Education Experience

Theme... ALL IN; Session One, Article One

He died for everyone so that those who receive his new life
will no longer live for themselves.
Instead, they will live for Christ, who died and was raised for them.
2 Corinthians 5:15 (NLT)

We recently spent time together at National Conference 2018 as districts—pastors, delegates and others—in conversation around a theme, ALL IN. We began by acknowledging that we as Christ-followers have been redeemed and united together in the Body of Christ. We also noted that we become participants in God’s mission to create a people to enjoy and be enjoyed by, as well as become active agents in the other aspects of God’s redemptive mission.

The educational experience on Thursday afternoon consisted of three teaching-learning discussions focused on identity (personal and corporate), community (church and neighborhood), and spiritual empowerment. Our sessions included:

- ALL IN has a personal element ... I am being redeemed.
- ALL IN has a church wide element ... We are being redeemed.
- ALL IN has an “engage the community” element ... We go forth with the redemptive message.

The following article is a quasi-manuscript (the best I can produce) plus a few extra thoughts (I ran out of time) of what was shared at Conference. The three teaching sessions will be offered in a series of short articles. My hope is that they help you remember what was said and what you discussed and then help you continue the conversation at home, at your church with the members you call family.

Session #1 . . . ALL IN—Body/Mind, Heart, and Soul (The Disciple) **Proverbs 4:23; Romans 12:1-2; John 15:4-7;** **Isaiah 40:31**

FIRST . . . please note that the intentions of this material are to address everyone—pastors and delegates—pastors who will check in with each other, who will hold each other accountable; pastors and delegates who will check in with each other, who will hold each other accountable; pastors and delegates who will take this home for their leadership teams and will not stop until the entire congregation—all ages—is on board.

ALL IN has a personal element. “I am being redeemed.” “You are being redeemed.”

Many Scriptures help us ponder this idea, that we are redeemed, especially that we are redeemed for a purpose.

And this purpose is bigger than going to Heaven when we die. The following Scriptures begin to point us in that direction:

- 2 Corinthians 5:15 (NLT) . . . He died for everyone so that those who receive his new life will no longer live for themselves. Instead, they will live for Christ, who died and was raised for them.
- Luke 9:23 (NIV) . . . Then [Jesus] said to them all: “If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me.”
- Ephesians 2:10 (NIV) . . . For we are God’s workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do.

That we have been redeemed, that we are servants of a King and of his Kingdom, leaves us grappling with certain realities. For instance, God has me, each one of us—pastor, delegate, church member—in ministry (or serving church and/or Kingdom) as one of the ways he is molding us into Christ’s image. We refer to this service as ministry.

Ministry, by virtue of its “above and beyond simply human” demands, helps mold us into Christ’s image or will break us as we play with serving out of our humanity. In either case, God works to redeem each of us for himself. The pressures and experiences of service and/or ministry can be used by God to redeem and/or remake each one of us. God will make us into someone new; sometimes, we must be broken in order to be remade.

Allow me to offer the most basic of basic truths: YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE. I know, that’s just too simple, too basic, and yet, so very true! YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE. This idea rubs against human nature: we too often want to be someone else, someone who with our myopic vision appears to have arrived.

A good number of years ago, Hawaiian shirts flew off store shelves and appeared in pulpits from the West Coast to the East Coast because Rick Warren wore Hawaiian shirts. For us, it was a kind of “Look Ma, No tie!” moment. Warren, larger-than-life, made casual acceptable. Few of us could pull it off. Our Hawaiian shirts are now pressed to the back of our closets.

Similarly, preaching methods and discipleship models rotate in and out of style because bigger names than WE THINK WE ARE shift gears mid-game or mid-career and take us along with them. Sadly, most tools like these seldom translate successfully into our backyard. They sound good at seminars and in our heads as we read the latest best seller.

My friends, before we consider the idea of ALL IN for the Kingdom of God, the churches we serve or attend, or even for ourselves, we need to get honest and own who we are.

Hi, my name is Les and I am a recovering sinner, rescued by grace, enjoying being fully known by God and seeking to know Him better.

My personal mission statement, why I live the way I do, is “I am committed to helping others realize a better quality of life.” In general, this applies to any aspect of life—health, well-being, education, relationships, employment. In ministry, this applies to spiritual health, meeting Jesus, embracing Jesus, and growing in Jesus.

As a pastor, this looks like a relational style of ministry, walking beside people until moments arise for me to speak of Christ’s Kingdom; a permission-giving and ministry-sharing approach, seeking to develop and launch men and women into ministry; a hands-on, let’s-do-this-together style of ministry, that weaves discipleship, training, and service into daily life.

My friends . . . Who are you? Where are you in life? Do you have a personal mission statement? If so, is that the mission that drives your daily life, that drives your ministry? Or are you, perhaps, living someone else’s life and mission?

Identity matters! Know yourself. Whether pastor or planter or delegate or even the bishop. **YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE.** Not who you want to be. Not who you imagine that you are. Not who others think you are. Not who you think others think you are. Not even who others wish you were. You can only truly be yourself.

“Who am I?” We **MUST** answer this question. Maybe you don’t have an immediate answer. Maybe you’re not sure how to answer. That’s okay. Knowing you don’t know is an amazing first step. It is admitting you don’t want to be living another’s life. It is opening the door to thought and conversation toward a personal mission statement.

There is a virtual candy store of resources and assessment tools to help make the journey inward so you can engage the outward adventure toward a “fit-and-flourish ministry.” These tools will help you “more honestly” define who you are so that you can measure who you are in light of biblical, Kingdom, and ministry expectations.

Tools like the DiSC, TJTA, Myers-Briggs, and GRIP-Birkman look at our personality. For the most part, these assessments address our nature/nuture design issues. Our self-reveal by way of Q&A, helps us draw a portrait of ourselves.

- The DiSC is an assessment of behavior based on four different behavioral traits: Dominance, Influence, Steadiness, and Compliance that help predict our behavior towards others and the everyday things we do.
- The TJTA is an assessment used to measure a number of important and comparatively independent common personality variable or attitudes AND behavioral tendencies that influence personal, social, marital, parental, family, scholastic, and vocational adjustment. Yes, even ministry!

- The Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) is an introspective self-report questionnaire with the purpose of indicating or identifying how we perceive the world around us and make decisions.
- Tools like the GRIP-Birkman look at our human design and spiritual rewiring. It includes our nature/nurture elements (Birkman Method) and adds in our spiritual rewiring by way of gifts, graces, and team play (Your Leadership GRIP).

One word of caution . . . when using any kind of skills or gifts inventory, be sure to consider your passions, “what makes your heart beat faster.” Gift inventories measure current and past behaviors, often missing what you might yet want to experience.

YOU ARE WHO YOU ARE.

The inward journey to capture a more accurate image of our own identity is the platform upon which we might build a life and ministry. But it’s only the start. What we do with who we discover we truly are is the next step, or series of steps.

We should quickly recognize that we are each multi-faceted people. We are not one dimensional. There is more to us than what can be seen, though that is indeed important. Beyond our unique identity, we are a body, mind, heart, and soul. Each aspect adds to “me” or “you.”

In the next article, we will discuss the makeup and care of each of these pieces of the whole person. Self-awareness, a genuinely good start, is simply not enough. We also need to apply ourselves to our health—body, mind, heart, and soul.



Pray Together Sunday — July 8, 2018




