WATCH THE WEARIES

It seems like time to dust off an old resolution I kept several years back. “Resolved – never to read the morning newspaper until AFTER I’ve spent my quiet time with the Lord in the Bible and prayer.” The recent regime change has brought a surge of disconcerting headlines. The Freedom of Choice Act threatens to overturn remaining restraints on abortion on demand. Advocates for same sex marriage have found new allies. Permission’s been given for embryonic stem cell research and protections for the convictions of “faith based” organizations are being targeted.

I know these aren’t the only issues over which followers of Christ hold strong feelings. There is considerable disagreement between us on many matters. I find encouragement in renewed conversations about justice for the poor, creation care, and a yearning for peace. Nevertheless, there are reasons that make it tempting for evangelicals to curl up into the fetal position and hope it will all just go away. It’s far better to spend time on our knees obeying the standing command to pray “for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful lives in all godliness and holiness.” 1 Tim. 2:1-2.

First century Christ followers had none of the “advantages” we’ve been spoiled to expect. They had no vote and no voice in the public arena. Others “controlled the microphone,” most of whom were hostile to the Gospel. Yet the disciples turned their world upside down by loving Jesus and loving others. It was a grass roots revival based on a life to life witness in neighborhood communities and among families. They knew it was more a matter of rendering to God than to Caesar. It still is.

I’m not suggesting that we abandon advocacy or fail to use duties and privileges that come with living in a democracy. I’m appealing to keep the main thing the main thing. “Some trust in chariots and horses, but we trust in the name of our God.” Ps. 20:7 As Chuck Colson wrote, “The Kingdom of God doesn’t arrive on Air Force One.”

Staying To Close

During a short devotion I heard recently, the minister told the story of the young man who fell off his bed. When he was asked how he could have fallen off the bed, his reply was that he guessed he “stayed too close to where I got in.” There are all kinds of spiritual implications that can be derived from that statement but there are also some great financial lessons that can be learned from “staying too close to where you got in.”

First of all, continuing to make the same contribution to your retirement account that you made when you first started working is “staying too close to where you got in.” As your income increases, you should increase your retirement and savings account. Also, as the children begin to leave the household and additional money is freed up, you should increase your contributions.



Secondly, the same investment allocation that worked for you when you started your retirement account may not be the best option for you today. Generally, a 30-year old is not going to have the same investment strategy as a 45-year old or a 60-year old. “Staying too close to where you got in” may be causing you to take excessive risk in your investment strategy.

Thirdly, have you checked your beneficiaries lately? If you have not updated your beneficiaries from the time you got into the retirement plan, you should re-evaluate who is entitled to receive your account in the event of your death. “Staying too close to where you got in” could cause your account, at your death, to pass to someone that you no longer wish to receive the account.

There are countless other examples that could be given. Suffice it to say, we live in an ever changing world, especially when it comes to finances. In this fast-paced environment, little comfort can be gained from “staying too close to where we got in.”

New Funds added to our 403(b) Pension Fund

The Benefit’s Corporation’s Board of Trustees approved the addition of the following two funds to our 403(b) Pension Plan portfolio: PIMCO Real Return Fund and Evergreen Precious Metals Fund. PIMCO is a “Treasury Inflation Protection Fund” and Evergreen is a specialty fund dealing in gold, silver and other precious metals. We tentatively have May 1st as the date that Prudential will have our account ready to accept contributions in these two funds, but this is subject to change. The Board of Trustees strongly encourages any Pension plan participant to consult with our Wachovia Representative, Jennifer Buehler, before making any changes in their choice of funds within their own pension account. Jennifer will again be at National Conference to answer any of your questions.

ALLONE Health/Wellness program is now into its 2nd month. We encourage our AETNA health insurance participants and any others who have enrolled in ALLONE to go online at www.myallonehealth.com and complete the Health Risk Assessment

(HRA). The responses back from those who have completed their HRA and taken the first call from their health coach have been very positive. Remember, plan participants who complete the HRA will receive a \$25 gift card. Another \$75 gift card will be awarded upon seeing your doctor and having the physical form completed and taking 2 calls from your health coach. The deadline for the \$25 card is June 30, 2009. The following letter was released by ETS concerning Dr. James L. Schwenk on February 13, 2009:

Effective December 31, 2008, Dr. James L. Schwenk has resigned from his position as Professor of Church History and Dean of Dech Chapel. Jim has faithfully served Evangelical since 1998, and his presence will be missed by faculty and students in the seminary community. While no longer a permanent member of the faculty, he will continue teaching church history as an adjunct professor during the spring semester and in the coming years as his schedule allows.

Jim made this decision in order to accept a full-time position with the Mount Hop Estate and Pennsylvania Renaissance Faire. He has also taken a part-time pastoral appointment at Grace Evangelical Congregational Church in Columbia, where he served prior to joining the faculty at Evangelical. While significantly different from the world of academia (and from each other), Jim is excited about these opportunities and sees the potential to use his natural abilities and gifts for God's glory.

CALL TO CHURCHES TO OPEN THEIR DOORS



A York County church has been hosting Noontime Prayer Meetings since Wednesday, January 7, 2009. St. David's E.C. Church, 2411 Oakland Road in Dover has opened its doors every Wednesday from Noon to 1:00 p.m. to pray specifically for the Lord to send revival to America as well as pray for those who have yet to become a follower of Jesus Christ. This is open to the entire community as believers from several denominations have been gathering each Wednesday for this prayer meeting.

The prayer meeting will follow the pattern of Noontime prayer meetings from 1857 – a time period in church history known as the Third Great Awakening. These meetings will not consist of any preaching of the Word of God and no theological discussion or debate will take place – only prayer for revival and the lost will happen.

It is the hope of the prayer meeting leader that other churches in Dover, York County, and this nation, will open their doors at Noontime for similar meetings. This will give people the opportunity to go to churches close to their places of employment to pray during the lunch hour. The current spiritual and economic conditions in America are similar to those in 1857 when historians estimate that as many as 50,000 people a week came into a personal relationship with Jesus Christ as a result of the Noontime prayer meetings.
