

DOROTHY R. STERMER, 94, of Above and Beyond Assisted Living, Allentown, formerly of the Episcopal House, Allentown died Tuesday, March 8, 2016 in VNA of St. Luke's Hospice House, Bethlehem. Born in Allentown, she was the daughter of the late Henry R. Stermer, well known music teacher in Allentown and organist at the former Trinity Evangelical Congregational Church and Helen (Wentz) Stermer. A 1938 graduate of Allentown High School, Dorothy attended Huntington College in Huntington, IN. She continued her education at New York City Biblical Seminary graduating in 1951. Dorothy was a missionary with TEAM, the Evangelical Alliance Mission, having served in Japan, Australia, Canada and Zimbabwe from 1951 until retiring in 1990. A lifelong member of the former Trinity Evangelical Congregational Church, Dorothy was a choir member and served as treasurer from 1990 to 1998. In 1998 the church merged with St Matthew's Evangelical Congregational Church, Emmaus and Dorothy became an active member serving as Home Department Superintendent and teaching Sunday school. She served as President of CELTS, Christian Endeavor Long Timers, from 1991 to 2000.

Dorothy's most important passion was reaching people for the Lord. ☺

It wasn't loaves and fishes, but when one small boy had a heart for missions, God gave the increase.



WE DIDN'T HAVE VBS for several years at Bunker Hill EC Church. We didn't have any kids. But now as our church has gradually grown and we have some young families attending, we felt we had enough children to hold VBS again these past 3 years. We have only averaged 12 to 15 students each year and the oldest child this year was 9 years old. We have lots of little kids! VBS has been challenging, but fun!


One of the things we enjoy doing is taking an offering every night to support the Bible School, and making the offering and attendance a friendly competition between the boys and the girls. Even with our small group of children, we have managed to make the Bible School self-sufficient. No small feat given that our Thursday night offering has always been devoted entirely to the mission project. And that is where this story really begins.

In 2014 our missions offering was \$141.00. As VBS director I was very proud of that, given our small group. Then in 2015 with approximately the same number of people, our mission offering was \$241.00 and I thought, "Wow, \$100.00 more than last year! Who would have thought we could do that?" I was very moved by the giving spirit of our children and

staff. We always make it a point to tell the children about the mission project during the early part of the week and then on Thursday when we take the offering, we try to do something special and explain more about the project for the year. This year I wore a huge sombrero that I bought in Mexico years ago and we had a piñata that the children broke during their game time. Here's where the story really gets good.

Enter eight year old Jeremiah who got up Thursday morning and asked his parents if he could have \$50 to put in the missions offering that night. No one knows why he came up with that amount. I suppose it sounded like a lot of money to him and a good amount to give. His parents didn't think they could afford to give him that much, considering his six year old sister Sofia was also attending VBS and would have wanted the same. They said they would think about it. Later in the day, without the other knowing, each of his parents gave \$20 to each of the children for the offering that night. When they realized what they had done, Jeremiah's dad thought it was a shame that the kids were now so close to having the \$50 each that they wanted, but he didn't really feel that they could give them anymore. He called his mother and explained what was going on and she said she would give each of the kids \$10.

And the snowball started rolling. Grandma went home and told Grandpa and Great-Grandma about what Jeremiah wanted to do. Then one of Dad's co-workers got involved along with the other Grandma. Then Jeremiah's next-door neighbor heard that he wanted to give \$50 to missions and gave the brother and sister each \$50. And so until God was done Jeremiah and Sofia each had \$151 to put in the missions offering that night. But the story doesn't end there. There were only 12 children present at Bible School that night. The other 10 children brought an offering totaling \$86. That's great! (How many times do we just give \$1 to God?) And the 12 teachers and helpers contributed \$271 for a grand total of \$659! Just think what a few people can do when God is at the center! I don't know how we're going to top this one next year! But I can't wait to see what God will do! ☺

Helping the Most Vulnerable

OUR VBS PROJECT for this year was to raise \$10,000 for the Mexico EC Conference. Bethel EC Church in Rio Bravo has seen the need to reach out to the street children in their community. These children often have only one parent and are at greater risk of being recruited by the drug cartels to carry drugs for them.

Bethel church has a large open patio, perfect for holding child evangelism programs. However, in order to protect the children, and to make it usable in all sorts of weather, they need to put a roof over the patio and a chain link fence around it. So far (as of the end of August), we have received \$9300 towards our goal. If your church held their VBS program already, please forward the offering as soon as possible. If your church doesn't hold a VBS program, or you are involved in a community VBS, would you consider taking a special offering to help us meet our goal? As you read in the previous article, one young boy's vision led to a miraculous response! Is there a Jeremiah in your church? Use some creative ways to encourage your Sunday School classes (adults and/or children) to help children in Mexico to hear about Jesus. Our hope is to be able to send the full amount of funds by the end of this year. Thank you to all who did participate in this project; you are helping to grow the Kingdom! ☺



Japan

PLANTING AND HARVESTING GOD'S GRACE IN JAPAN

WITH THE CHRISTIAN POPULATION hovering around 1%, Japan is often seen as a spiritually barren field even though it is one of the wealthiest countries in the world. However, God in his loving kindness continues to reach into Japan, planting the life-changing truth of the Good News through local expressions of the Body of Christ. One such new expression is the Grace Garden Church plant, launched on Easter Sunday by Yoriyoshi and Emiko Abe in Ebina City. The reasoning behind the name is intentional. *"We pray that this spiritually barren field turns into the garden of grace so we named the new church: Grace Garden Church."* After much prayer, consideration and vision casting this new fellowship began with thirty people in attendance, about half of which were not Christians. Since the launch Grace Garden Church is averaging sixteen people with new visitors almost every Sunday. They have begun a women's group and hope to start other small groups in the near future. Prayer is the power behind the success they have achieved so far. If you doubt that God is intentionally reaching into Japan, consider this edited excerpt from Yoriyoshi and Emiko's recent newsletter.



One of the biggest surprises to us was to meet an international family who returned to Japan six months ago. They were looking for a church near their house in Ebina City. The husband is an American who has taken seminary courses and has a passion to teach and worship and his Japanese wife used to work at a church in Tokyo. He is helping Emiko's worship ministry and she is interested in helping our church in various ways. We believe that

their coming to us was the result of prayer and we hope to build a good ministry team with them.

Tomoyuki and Jessica are also experiencing God's intentional love for the people of Japan through Fuchinobe Community Church. They testify to God's faithfulness in their Spring newsletter (edited).

At the end of May we celebrated FCC's sixth anniversary and God's many blessings. Philippians 4:4-7 reminded us that in the midst of the uncertainty and various challenges we face as a small church plant...there have been many things to be thankful for. Recently we witnessed the salvation of a young gal whose twin sister had become a Christian in January. Now these two with their mother have been growing in the faith as a family and taking an active role at FCC.

Tomoyuki is preaching on vision and leading the members of congregation to consider their specific roles in the vision of the church. About a year ago the GMC agreed to open a building fund to start facing the major challenge for FCC – a lack of space and limited resources in a



country with very expensive property. We are at about half way to the goal of raising enough funds to start renting a space big enough for all the ministry needs. ☺



India

NEW LEADERSHIP, NEW VISION FOR AN OLD MISSION

NORTH EAST INDIA is often considered a predominantly Christian area of the world however that is an oversimplification. Even though the Gospel has been in this part of the world for over 100 years, North East India is comprised of many states that range in Christian population from .03% to 90%. The Evangelical Congregational Church of India (ECCI) is made up of six presbyteries or conferences totaling about 60,000 members formed along tribal/language lines to reach as many of these states as possible. Currently the six conferences deploy over 200 missionaries in 80 stations working in over 20 people groups and languages and 5 major religions. Through the work of these missionaries and the 2,000 members within these mission stations, churches are planted, schools established and the Good News of Jesus Christ is shared in both



word and deed. In 2015 the mission stations reported 262 new converts, 150 baptisms and 65 backsliders restored.

Most of the states have a higher population of youth and young adults so efforts concentrate on reaching and preparing them for the mission. Recently 150 youth from 13 local churches gathered on the campus of the Evangelical College of Theology, to get to know one another while cleaning and preparing the campus for the start of the new academic year. This is the first time in the history of the EC Church of India that such a "work team mission" took place.

The leaders of the six presbyteries met together April 22-25, 2016 for the Fourth General Leaders' Conference. The GMC hosted a delegation to this conference which included Bishop Bruce Hill, Chairman Nobuo Abe and Tomoyuki Abe from EC Japan, Director Th. Janga from EC Nepal and Rev. Randy Sizemore, Associate of Global Ministries. Our team was privileged to serve as speakers and resource persons for the conference, to support the election of the next General Director of ECCI, to strengthen our relationships with new and existing ECCI leaders, to encourage the faculty and staff of the Evangelical College of Theology and to cross-pollinate our USA, India, Nepal, Japan conferences.

Rev. Dr. Kaitinkap Vaiphei was elected to serve as the General Director (Bishop)



of ECCI for a four year term. Besides the election of a new General Director, other key leadership positions were filled and the conference officially endorsed the "Covenant of ECCI" drafted by key leaders at a special gathering in October 2015 which maps out the way forward for the six presbyteries to proceed in unity, purpose and the mission of telling the old, old story of Jesus and his love. Please continue to pray for and support the work of the EC Church of India. Even though the Church continues to grow, conversion usually brings opposition. Political and spiritual persecution of Christians is on the rise and separatists and insurgents with competing agendas complicate daily life and hinder the work of ministry. ☸

Liberia

YOU FEED THEM!

YOU'VE READ IT, I've preached it. Jesus' startling command to his resourceless disciples overlooking a multitude of needs, "You feed them!" Rev. Abraham Powell, the newly elected Bishop of the EC Church of Liberia has a good idea of how Jesus' words to his disciples must have felt. Since his election and installation, he has conducted a tour of the four districts comprising the EC Church of Liberia (ECCOL) and has comprised a rather daunting list of the needs. Here are a few of the major needs and challenges facing ECCOL.

- The growing Muslim population: Muslim males marrying Christian girls and forcing them and their children to convert.
- Bible illiteracy: Many Believers cannot read English or their Bassa tribal language so they are susceptible to false teachings and synchronizing the Christian doctrine with tribal religion.
- Physical state of the local church facilities: most church buildings are in deplorable condition.
- Lack of transportation for local & district pastors: many must walk for miles to minister.
- Lack of education: Some villages where we have churches have upward to 100 children and no nearby school.

- Lack of resources and equipment for children and youth ministry: It is easy to attract 150 children and youth to a Christian camp IF you can feed and house them and have materials and equipment to "do camp" with them.

The GMC is committed to helping ECCOL share the Good News of Jesus Christ in both word and deed. Let's be honest, if we were able to miraculously meet all these needs today, there would be more tomorrow, therefore we are determined to help ECCOL meet needs and develop ministries that

can be as sustainable, successful and as self-sufficient as possible. The GMC has decided that the best way we can help in the short term is by raising the funds for motorcycles for district pastors in 2016 and by helping to fund a pilot Biblical literacy program on a small scale in 2017 with the hopes of increasing the scope of the program as we work out the wrinkles and come up with a reproducible program.

Mexico

TIME FOR THE HARVEST

THE PASTORS, WIVES AND DELEGATES

from the 12 congregations and mission stations that make up the EC Church of Mexico met March 30-April 1, 2016 for their 39th Annual Conference under the theme, "Time For The Harvest." The GMC hosted a delegation to this conference which included Bishop Bruce Hill, Rev. Carlos Kelly, Pastor Janor Bestwick and GMC Associate, Rev. Randy Sizemore. We were privileged to be speakers and resource people for the conference. Both Bishop Hill and Janor Bestwick led small group workshops during the conference. We were very excited to see first-hand the impact of the previous year's intensive training for the pastors and wives and

pastoral families. We also made a follow up visit to the building project, Casa De Dios in Rio Bravo where the Great Lakes Work Team recently installed electrical wiring and lights.

Amidst the challenging conditions of poverty, drug violence and the disintegration of the family, the EC Church of Mexico is actively and effectively sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ. Since my last visit they have established two new mission stations and continue to reach into their culture in a variety of creative ways. During one of the conference sessions the pastors and delegates shared how their local congregations were intentionally reaching into their communities. These efforts included the following ministries.

- Conference-wide church camp for youth
- Marriage and family ministries
- Women & men's ministries
- Implementing the IGLEKids children's ministry
- Small group ministries
- Youth ministries
- Adult Bible Institute programs

Through these ministries and more, last year 44 people were brought to Christ, 12 were baptized and discipleship continues. The mission conference has



made steady progress toward being granted National Conference status and our hopes are that the remaining steps can be completed so that we can grant National Conference status to the EC Church of Mexico at the 2017 sessions of our USA National Conference at Messiah College.

EL RETIRO CHILDREN'S HOME

WE CONTINUE TO HELP El Retiro Children's Home transition as our official partnership with them will come to an end in January 2018. Many of the children utilizing ERJ have been relocated to other service providers and the remaining few will relocate with their current school cycles. We have encouraged directors Carlos & Martha to take a short sabbatical following the relocation of the children while the Board of Directors of ERJ continues working on future ministry options for the facility.

Nepal

CHURCH PLANTING, POLITICS AND PERSECUTION

Note: because of increased scrutiny and persecution, we are not printing specifics in this Nepal update. Contact the GMC office to receive a specific update via email.

"No person shall be entitled to convert another person from one religion to another and shall not take actions or behave in a way that would create disturbance in another's religion"

This statement in Nepal's constitution has made converting others to Christianity illegal in a Hindu majority nation since 2015. The ambiguous wording is also being used to define "converting" as something as simple as handing out Bibles or literature

or inviting children to VBS. Last September Hindu extremists warned all foreign Christian missionaries to leave the country, accusing them of corrupting the nation.

In spite of these obstacles the Gospel goes forward and the Church continues to grow. Our friends in Nepal are dealing with various kinds of persecution and scrutiny so open communication and internet postings have been kept at a minimum. Please pray for pastors, missionaries and Christians in Nepal as they continue to share the Good News, plant local congregations and minister to the marginalized.



Introducing...

ACTUALLY, SHE doesn't need any introduction. Beth Grimm is known to many EC'ers, especially if they have been involved with missions in the EC Church for a length of time. Beth was initially commissioned as a missionary in 1978. She served for a number of years with Africa Inland Mission in Tanzania as a teacher at Victoria Primary School. Beth returned home to complete her graduate studies as a Reading Specialist. She eventually was seconded to Wycliffe Bible Translators and worked in the Field Education System, a method of home school extension program geared for missionary children in the field. She worked out of Christian Academy of Guatemala for several years. During this time she had an increasing burden for children with learning disabilities. So Beth returned to the USA once again for training with the National Institute for Learning Disabilities.

Beth has continued her training while in the USA. She is currently a licensed school psychologist and education specialist. Beth has been self-employed for the past nine years, doing tutoring, testing, academic coaching, and consultations with home schools, Christian and cyber schools as well as private schools. Beth's unique skills as a school psychologist, reading specialist and educational therapist have made her in high demand for missionary boarding schools around the world.

Beth will be serving under Wycliffe Associates and currently plans to make 2-3 trips overseas a year as a consultant. Her work load may increase as time and finances allow. Beth will be re-commissioned on October 16th at her home church of Grace Community at Willow Street, PA. We welcome Beth back into active missionary status and know that God will use her talents to serve His servants around the world. ☺

Our kids and staff painted homes and benches, cut grass, pulled weeds, planted flowers, built memorials at the trail of hope, fed and played games with less fortunate children, interacted with those young and elderly that needed to know Christ loves them.
