

FROM THE DESK Bishop Bruce Hill



Did you ever ask the Lord for a sign? You were facing a difficult choice and you just wished the Lord would give you a sign. At the time of Jesus many of the religious leaders believed only God could give signs from heaven. One day some Pharisees and Sadducees confronted Jesus in order to test him. They demanded Jesus perform some great "miraculous sign from heaven" to prove His authority; to prove He was the Messiah.

Sometimes I wonder why Jesus didn't just do it and shut them up, but it wasn't the Father's time yet. Instead, Jesus called their attention to a common saying about the weather,

"Red sky at night means fair weather tomorrow; red sky in the morning means foul weather all day." (Matthew 16:2-3a)

Jesus was saying the religious leaders could read the skies for weather, but they couldn't figure out the "signs of the times" all around them.

When we look at this conversation in context, we discover it occurred soon after Jesus miraculously fed over 5,000 people with just five loaves of bread and two fish. Then disciples saw Him walk on water and when they arrived on the shore of the Sea of Galilee, the crowds gathered around Him and Matthew tells us, "all who touched Him were healed." (Matthew 14:36) Jesus healed a girl who had a demon, He healed many more, and then fed over 4,000 more people. Yet these leaders confronted Jesus and demanded a "miraculous sign from heaven to prove His authority." (Matthew 15:1)

Jesus responds saying in effect, you want a sign proving that I am the Messiah, the anointed one of God? The sign "I will give is the sign of the prophet Jonah." (Matthew 16:4) Yes, that's the Jonah from the Jonah and the whale story. So, what's the sign of Jonah? Go back into your childhood Sunday School memories; how long was Jonah inside the big fish? [Three days.] In a similar passage Jesus said,

"...so will the Son of Man be in the heart of the earth for three days and three nights." (Matthew 12:40)

Jesus says, "you want a sign? Then, you just wait. I'll give you a sign you can't miss - my resurrection."

Jesus gives us all a sign of who He is – a suffering Savior who gave Himself to die on a cross, buried in the earth for three days, and then, like Jonah, miraculously come back to life. The resurrection of Jesus, His victory over sin, death and the grave, is the miraculous sign, the proof, that Jesus is who He said He is; the Messiah, the Savior, the Son of God.

Christianity is not based on blind faith; it is to believe based on evidence. My response to the truth of the resurrection is to trust in Jesus, to follow Him in discipleship, and to serve Him with my whole life.





From Bishop Bruce Hill:

I continue to be deeply concerned for our pastors, lay leaders, and churches. As David Brooks, a conservative political and cultural commentator for the New York Times has put it, for the past two years and counting we have felt, "disoriented, disturbed, unmoored...in a yawning chasm of mutual incomprehension. The atmosphere within many Christian organizations has grown more tense and bitter. Pastors are exhausted – partly because of Covid but partly because every word they use is scrutinized to see if it passes this or that theological litmus test." And it all happened with startling speed.

It is in response to this burden and concern that one of my last projects as bishop is this series of videos in which I, along with Steve Brubaker, Counseling Pastor at Grace Community Church of Willow Street, and Dr. Ken Miller, retired Professor of Theology, will address how we deal with the hurts and woundedness so many of us are dealing with today. I believe we all can identify in some way with the prophet Jeremiah when he wrote,

"I will never forget this awful time, as I grieve over my loss." Yet Jeremiah would say with the next breath, "Yet I still dare to hope." (Lamentations 3:20-21)

I pray this series of 8-minute videos will be helpful in moving us toward healing hurts, binding wounds, and preparing us all to move forward with overflowing hope at National Conference 2022.

with any questions or call 717-866-7581 + Thanks to everyone for completing the Workers Compensation forms on a timely basis. The audit is currently in process, and we hope to have a final bill soon from Church Mutual. We get questions from time to time on completing a workers compensation claim. The process is not complicated, but it is confusing since claims are not filed often. Each church is responsible for filing their own claims at the time of the incident or shortly thereafter. The easiest method is to use Church Mutual's online claim reporting portal,

File a Claim | Church Mutual. Fill out the claim form with the best information available; the employer is the local EC church, each EC church is listed on the policy, and the policy number is 07-174436. Please call with any questions.

+ Since we are on the topic of the annual Workers Compensation audit, be prepared next year, 2023, for an earlier deadline in late January 2023, as more information will be requested. The Commonwealth of PA and other states have increased the complexity of Workers Compensation audits which will require the EC denomination to provide more information sooner. The new audit rules do not fit the unique structure of church denominations and group workers compensation policies. It will be almost impossible for us, and most other church denominations, to comply with the new audit rules. Our insurer, Church Mutual, understands the dilemma faced by church groups, but the Commonwealth of PA does not understand. Currently, exactly what information we will be required to provide is not known. Church Mutual is hoping churches will receive some regulatory relief.

+ Churches not included in the denominational Workers Compensation Group policy; Ohio, Illinois and Kentucky - your individual state mandates Workers Compensation coverage. Please confirm that all employees of the church are covered by Workers Compensation Insurance. Per EC Benefits Corporation policy H.3.b., churches not covered by the denomination group Workers Compensation policy shall submit proof of Workers Compensation coverage by July 1 of each year. Please submit proof of your workers compensation coverage to: EC Benefits, 100 W Park Ave., Myerstown, PA 17067; or fax 717-866-7553 or email dking@eccenter.com.

+ The annual disability premium was due January 15, and the Benefit Corporation administrative fee is due by April 15, 2022 (retirees are not subject to the administrative fee.) Both of these fees are listed in the Treasurer's Guide available on the <u>EC Center website</u>. Many have remitted the disability fee timely, and a few have already submitted the administrative fee and we thank you for your diligence and hard work.

+ Treasurers, please confirm that you are remitting your ministry fund payments on the correct monthly form. In 2022 the ministry fund percentage is 5.65%.

+ To date, about 80% of pastoral compensation forms have been returned. Thanks to all the churches that have responded. We will be reminding non-compliant churches to complete and submit their pastoral compensation forms. Please save Dave King some work by submitting your pastoral compensation forms as soon as possible.



Empowering National Churches

The EC Global Ministries Community (GMC) continues to seek to enable our international churches to be self-governing, selfsustaining, and self-propagating through the leadership we provide, and the support of the local EC Church in the United States. This mission demands a strong connected relationship between the EC Church USA and our international partners.

This month we highlight the ministries of our EC churches in Japan.



Current ECCJ Chairman, Rev. Nobuo Abe, pastors Sagamihara Grace Chapel. (His son, Tomoyuki and daughter-in-law Jessica, are EC missionaries currently serving in France.) Yoriyoshi Abe, nephew of Nobuo, completed a M.Div. degree at Evangelical Seminary in Myerstown, and he and wife Emiko returned to Japan after graduation to continue church planting throughout the Tokyo region. But Japan is still a very difficult country to evangelize, with only about 1% claiming to know Jesus as Savior. Our churches have been reaching out through various ministries: daycare, English classes, training for young mothers, etc. to reach the needs of the Japanese people. Please continue to uphold our pastors and church members in prayer as they reach out in love to their family, friends and neighbors in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

<u>The Art of Neighboring: Connecting with our</u> <u>Local Communities</u>

This hands-on workshop is designed to help you explore how to identify points of intersection between the DNA of your church and that of the surrounding community. With these insights, participants will examine ways to build missional "bridges" between church and community. The aim of the interactive sessions will be for each church represented to generate action steps to build relationships and ministries with your neighbors.

Three teaching sessions (Who are we? Who are they? What bridges can be created between us?) are followed by handson workshops (church teams actually processing the material that was shared). The final session is designed to leave each church team with solid plans and action steps toward missional connections with their communities.



The Art of Conversation Conversation!

When was the last time you started a conversation? With a stranger? Smooth? Awkward? When was the last time a conversation included Jesus?

As Christians, we get to talk about Jesus. Sharing Jesus usually starts with a conversation and a relationship and trust.

Consider developing new conversational skills. This 3-hour workshop is a conversation about conversations. There is an art to making space for conversations. Discover resources, develop ideas, and practice the art of moving from "hello" to something deeper, even Gospel focused. Deciding to be prepared usually guarantees they will happen. Resources and ideas will address starting conversations, redirecting conversations, and leaving space for future conversations.

Powerful Leadership & Prepared Members

It's a great feeling to know that your leadership positions are all filled. It is equally satisfying to know your people want to make a difference. It's a different reality, however, knowing the right person is in the right role for the right reason.

God empowers his Church through spiritual gifts, holy enablements given to each believer. Identifying and developing our spiritual gifts are steps toward impactful ministry. We can do the best we can do, or we can thrive as we effectively serve out of our gifting.

A Leadership Grip workshop would provide insights on building a better church leadership team, as well as help you equip your congregation, for powerful ministries. And maybe save someone from burnout!



Cash for Missional Coaching

Remember the last training event you attended? No? That is not unusual. That probably also means the training did not stick long enough to become new ministry adventure. That is also not unusual. Perhaps you are now hesitant to attend another workshop or teaching-learning experience. Don't be!

The Kingdom Extension Community (KEC) would like to partner with you (pastor) or your leadership team or congregation to make sure your next learning experience becomes ministry. The KEC would like to help pay for up to six months of coaching attached to training and ministry that is missional or Kingdom-focused. That is, we would like to pay for coaching designed to help you make use of new learning that moves you and your church family out of the building to develop a ministry not attached to what happens in your sanctuary.

What might that look like? A church plant? A dinner church? A fresh expression of church? This is about creating a ministry where one wasn't before to people who were not ministered to before.

Ministerial Development Community News

<u>Callings</u>: Every Christian receives a variety of spiritual gifts useful for God's kingdom. Some individuals sense some deeper understanding of these gifts and are drawn toward leading congregational life in churches as pastors. These callings often begin with greater passion and participation in the life of a local church body or an extension of the church in the community or parachurch organization. Many individuals hunger and thirst for ways to be available and utilized in God's greater kingdom. If you or someone you know is experiencing these qualities, you might want to have a conversation with your lead pastor.

Pastors: Please do not hesitate to contact me to discuss the process for someone to answer their calling and move forward toward receiving credentials within the Evangelical Congregational Church. We are excited to help them in areas of preparation, calling, assessment, theological hospitality, and education, as well as coaching. As the Ministerial Development Community serves in this vital role, we still need you to speak into the lives and prepare the hearts of new candidates for ministry.

PAC Update: This year, we have regretfully accepted the resignation of Rev. Kirk Marks as the director of our Pastoral Assessment Center. As we say goodbye to Kirk, we are grateful for everything that he has done with this intensive week in so many EC pastoral couples' lives. I wish I could provide an accurate number, but I do know that over 100 applicants have moved through PAC during Kirk's tenure. The influence and direction provided by our Pastoral Assessment Center process is something that other denominations only wish that they can achieve. Today, the EC Church stands on much healthier ground because pastors have been effectively provided with support early in their calling as they launch out into their assigned ministries. We gratefully acknowledge the many contributions that Kirk has made in not only conducting PAC, but also through improving the process over the years. We say, *"Take a bow, Maestro!"*

Pastoral Health: We are gaining some momentum in providing a vision for pastoral health initiatives. We hope to provide some initiatives that will assist our pastors in finding a healthier way to conduct ministry in our current cultural context. Here are some of the concepts from initial discussions from the pastoral care team:

The goal of the pastoral health arm of the Ministerial Development Community is to develop and implement member care strategies which equip EC pastors toward caring for themselves spiritually, physically, and emotionally.

The term "member care" is borrowed from the world of global missions. The following definition, although broader in scope, expresses the values of member-care by the National Conference of the EC church for its pastors. The Evangelical Alliance Mission (TEAM) definition of member-care is "the ongoing investment of resources by mission agencies, churches and other mission organizations for the nurture and development of missionary personnel." Seeing as the itinerancy is defined by the Evangelical Congregational Church as a "self-disciplining body of ordained elders" (2016 EC Discipline; paragraph 514), we see pastors (such as DFDs) helping local pastors to help themselves. Member-care encourages self-care. District Field Directors can be effective in this way by developing strategies that deliver member care services. The outcome of producing a culture of pastors, healthy enough and supported enough to care for themselves in their ministries, is a connectional biproduct of member/self-care.
