As we turn the page to a New Year, we are reminded that our God is the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end. He is as old as eternity and as new as tomorrow! What I love about our God is He cares more for the people of each generation, culture, tribe, ethnicity than He does about preserving a certain heritage or tradition. The question needs to be asked,

In our National Conference over 80% of our congregations average less than 100 in attendance and the majority of those are averaging under 50 on Sunday morning. Ministry and theological training for pastors is changing rapidly to equip and deploy the new breed of pastors needed for these challenging, yet exciting days of opportunity! Churches are getting creative in networking, adoption, mergers, and other non-traditional ways to continue the mission of **knowing Christ and making Him known** to their communities.

Of course, there are some that will not be moved! They insist on preserving their comfort and their traditions above reaching their neighbors with the Good News. What if God said,

"I'm only coming to people the way I came the first time, as a Tewish baby in a manger in Bethlehem. If people want to know Me then they will have to make the journey to meet Me where I am."

I am so glad God comes to us in our space, our time, and our culture to meet us where we are with His Good News! My prayer for all of us in the EC Church is that this new year will encourage us to release our old ways and to share the old, old story of Jesus and His love in new ways that allow our neighbors to meet our Savior where they are!

- + The **2023 IRS Mileage Reimbursement** rate has not been released as of the writing of this article.
- + Active pastor **Health Insurance** premiums will increase 3% from the 2022 rates.

Single \$ 870 Couple \$1,844 Employer & Child(ren) \$1,741 Family \$2,297

The first payment of the new year was due December 15, 2022. Please see www.eccenter.com for the 2023 rates.

The deadline to submit **HRA reimbursements** for the July 22 – December 2022 plan year is March 31, 2023. This is a federally mandated deadline that cannot be changed.

- + Church contributions to the **403(b) pension** plan will increase on January 1 to \$360 for full-time pastors and \$180 for part-time pastors. Please continue to submit pension contributions to EC Benefits Corporation, 100 W. Park Ave., Myerstown, PA 17067 until a change is announced.
- + EC Benefits Corp services fee is \$125 payable on April 15, 2023.
- + W-2s and 1099-NEC (Non-Employee Compensation) forms are due to the recipients by January 31, 2023 and the respective Federal, State or Local taxing authorities by January 31, 2023. Please refer to the specific taxing authority regulations for due dates. All full-time and part-time pastors should receive a W-2 from their church. The 1099-NEC is a new form, replacing the 1099-MISC; in most instances for churches for payments made during 2022, to be filled by January 31, 2023.
- + **Due Dates:** Disability Payment is \$100.00 due January 15
 Annual Statistical Reports are due January 25
 Workers Compensation Insurance Information is due 30 days after receipt Pastors Compensation Forms are due January 15
- + The **workers compensation audit** is going to have a compressed deadline this year and every year after due to changing legislative regulations. Lay leaders please keep watch on your email for important information.
- + Please see the **2023 Treasurer's Guide** located on <u>www.eccenter.com</u>, for additional due dates, current amounts due and ministry fund percentage.

+ Remember to add the following phrase (or something close to it) to all tax deductible giving receipts issued by a church or ministry:

"No goods or services were exchanged for these contributions, or they consisted of an intangible religious benefit."

All year-end contributions to a church must be received at the church on December 31 or have a postmark of December 31 or earlier. Electronic giving adds a layer of complexity to the year-end giving deadlines. There are extra entities involved, e.g., credit card processors, banks and internet gateways, in the processing of an electronic charitable contributions that churches and donors cannot control. The amount of time from the donor making a contribution until the church receives the funds can be a couple of days to a week or more. Church treasurers should carefully review the processing statements received to note what day a contribution was processed.

IRS Guidance states that **contributions made by credit card** in 2022 are considered 2022 contributions, regardless if the donor does not make a payment on the credit card until 2023 or with normal credit card processing times the church does not receive the funds until 2023. The same is true for donations made via an ACH transfer. A donor that initiates an ACH transaction in 2022 with the funds debited from the donor's bank account should be counted as a 2022 donation, even though the church will not receive the funds until 2023 with normal bank processing times.

EC LEADER JANUARY 2023



On behalf of Franklin Graham, Samaritan's Purse, and the GMC, we would like to thank all the churches that participated in the Operation Christmas Child ministry this year. We received reports from 30 churches in the Conference who shared with us the number of shoeboxes that they collected. The total amount of shoeboxes collected from these churches that reported in this year was **2,683**. We praise God for each of these "Gospel Opportunities." The lives of children all around the world will be touched with the Love of Christ and the Gospel because of your faithful partnership. In addition to this, 2 of our churches Community Evangelical in Sinking Springs, PA, and Weigelstown St. David's in Dover, PA, served as drop-off centers for Operation Christmas Child and processed over **12,000** additional boxes each from other churches that dropped them off at their locations.

As many of you are probably aware, after the shoeboxes are distributed at a local church, the children are then invited to attend a 12-week Discipleship Class called *The Greatest Journey*. At the end of that class on the final week, the children are challenged to write down the names of 9 others that they will share the Gospel with. So, each shoebox has the potential of reaching 10 people with the Good News of Jesus. If we multiply 2,683 by 10 that gives us a number of **26,830**. That is the potential of how many people could be reached with the Gospel just from our EC churches alone.

Most all the churches mentioned that on the Sunday when they collected the shoeboxes, that they had a special prayer of dedication over the shoeboxes. However, some of the churches shared with us some special things that they did to promote Operation Christmas Child in their church. Lititz Trinity purchased 125 pairs of "shoes that grow" for their boxes. Tamaqua collected over \$4,000 to cover the shipping of their boxes. Bridgeville collected items all year and then had a packing party. They also had a chicken BBQ in October to raise money for the shipping and made \$1,500. Instead of packing shoeboxes this year, Conestoga Bethel sent in money to Samaritan's Purse as a donation for the shipping of boxes. Herndon New Life also had a packing party and collected school supplies for the boxes as a part of their VBS. Annville Zion dedicated their boxes on the Sunday of the 51st Anniversary of their building and Bishop Randy Sizemore gave the dedicatory prayer. Bangor First church packed 25 boxes in memory of Janet Becker who started and led the Operation Christmas Child ministry in their church since 2002. They also packed an additional 55 boxes as well.

One of the beautiful things about Operation Christmas Child is that every church can do it no matter what the size. You can notice from the stories shared above that they are from all different sizes of churches. It is a fun and easy way for your church to get involved in missions and to reach out beyond yourself.

Once again, we want to say thank you for your partnership in the Gospel through your involvement with Operation Christmas Child. We encourage you to keep praying because many of the distributions have not yet occurred. Please pray that the Lord will direct each box into the hands of the child that He intends it to go to. Also, please continue to pray for favor with customs so that the boxes will arrive safety. And most importantly, pray for the child who receives the box that he or she will come to know the Lord personally and be touched by His Love.

Check My Math?



I was a weird one, I'm sure, because I always loved math class. I don't even know why I loved it so much, and to this day I honestly think I am TERRIBLE at math. One thing I do know, is that most of the time, multiplication is better than addition. Especially when it comes to growth. While two plus two is the same as two times two, four plus four doesn't come near four times four and so on. For most of us, this simple math concept becomes foreign when it comes to our ministry context.

Living in a post-Christendom world has forced most of our churches to embrace a survival mindset and the reality of subtraction in most of our churches has caused us to adopt a posture of simply trying whatever we can to keep our doors from closing. Unfortunately, when we can only muster believing God to keep our numbers steady, our behaviors start causing us to become so inward focused that addition is unlikely, let alone multiplication.

The early church exploded on the scene with a multiplication mindset. They made disciples who made disciples.

Paul challenges Timothy in 2 Timothy 2:1 to make disciples who make disciples.

The mission of the church is to make disciples who make disciples.

When our pool of people to disciple is exhausted, where do we turn?

Do we see endless opportunities in our neighborhood, workplaces, and schools?

Do we pray regularly and passionately for people to disciple?

When we disciple, are we equipping others to make disciples who make disciples?

Part of our problem is that we have created an addition scorecard. We ask ourselves and each other, "how many people have you added or lost to your church this year?" As a matter of fact, most of us as pastors run this score card through our heads every week. Was my attendance higher this week than last week? If so, we feel like we are doing ok, we are winning. If not, we see anxiety creep in and we think we are losing.

What if we changed the score card? What if we created a metric that looked at how our generations of disciples are active in our churches? How many of your disciples are discipling someone else? How many disciples have multiplied themselves into someone who is multiplying themselves?

I do believe that multiplication has to become the culture of our churches if we are going to become the movement of God we believe he is calling us to be. Institute for Church Leadership

The Institute for Church Leadership has a wonderful opportunity for your churches. This spring we are offering two classes that could significantly help the people in your church family engage with God's word. You heard that right: ICL classes are for everyone! We are wondering if you can please encourage your people to consider taking the classes. Perhaps your church would even subsidize the cost of the classes for those who complete them? Take a look at the summary of our spring 2023 courses, and I think you'll see how meaningful they will be to your people.

Institute for Church Leadership Spring 2023 classes:

<u>Hermeneutics, Tuesdays, February 7 – March 21, 6:30-9:15 p.m.</u>

Course Description: This course is an introduction to the interpretation of the Biblical text. The course will cover some of the basic skills of biblical interpretation, as well as exploring issues surrounding questions concerning what the Bible is and how it "works." The course will help equip the student to interpret, teach, and preach the Biblical text in a pastoral setting with an emphasis on moving from interpretation to appropriate application. Instructor: Tim Seiger

OT Survey, Tuesdays, May 2 - June 13, 6:30-9:15 p.m.

Course Description: In this course the student surveys Old Testament literature, history, geography, culture, theology, and structure to understand and communicate what the Old Testament reveals about God. Additional issues addressed include: Who are the important people and nations? What are the significant events, and where do they happen? How is the Old Testament put together? How does the Old Testament apply to us today? What resources are available to understand, teach, and preach the Old Testament? Instructor: Tim Valentino

We also want to let our EC family know that we have updated the ICL curriculum. Each term, starting Fall 2023, we will offer one formative course and one informative course. Formative courses are designed to help students grow in their discipleship to Jesus and in their ministry practice. Informative courses are designed to help students learn about the Bible, theology and history, which of course will help form them as disciples of Jesus. Take a look at our new course schedule.
