"Be Still" Journaling— A Different View

When my husband Mike's first "Be Still" devotional book was hot off the press he asked me to start using it stating: "Given your busy schedule; if you can do this, anyone can!" Well, that would have worked if I was a person that could actually journal. I've always admired those that could sit still long enough, clear their minds without being [is that a cow over there] distracted and build their thoughts on paper. I

write as I speak—in fragments—most often. Frustrated with my own disappointing reaction; I tried and tried again. Sometimes I would almost actu-



ally write down a sentence but it ended up to be yet another poor attempt at an actual continual thoughtful prose in response to the journal's poignant questions.

Step back well over 40 years in time and a middle school girl who would write poems to express observations. [Cumulus clouds are puffy and bright and when they are out there is no rain in sight.] Now flash forward to a high school girl, who would write poems over love lost or high school days [1969 class poem]. In later years a poem would be written as an outlet for bereavement or in thoughts

expressed for a new love, family, and inspiration.

And now to the present, and as a senior citizen [albeit still in denial], God is speaking loud and clear on this issue of journaling. Certainly your thoughts are written—not in journal prose but in verse. Then early one morning, during my "be still" moment, I wrote a poem to capture my "favorite verse" from the weekly reading. That began my first official "be still" poem expression and interpretation of journal entries to coincide with the weekly reading. Oh, not actually in the devotional book understand. I type

I've read that a poem is the use of words in their best order; while poetry is the use of the best words in their best order. This is why my thoughts are indeed poems and not poetry. They are inspired but never perfect to the poet laureate; not for show, but for the glory of God.

In recent weeks while sitting among the trees in the mountains of northern Pennsylvania, I took a picture of the tall strong, straight and noble trees. They clearly have withstood abuse from insects, birds, rain, windstorms, and even chainsaws. That particular morning as I read Hebrews 12, the words began a rhyme to the image of the trees in one particular verse. At the time I wasn't thinking of the word "Revival" per se. not until a conversation where I was asked about an article on my poems and the theme "Revival" did it click. [Sometimes I am a little slow on that listening to God part.]

The following poem is shared with all who may find that place within; where their spirit can be revived again.
