News from BENEFITS CORPORATION

- The 2017 mileage reimbursement has decreased to \$0.535 per mile driven.
- The January 2017 health insurance premiums increased from the 2016 rates, with the first payment due December 15, 2016 at the new rates. Please see www.eccenter.com for the current rates.
- The deadline to submit HRA reimbursements for the October 2015-September 2016 plan year is December 29, 2016. This is a federally mandated deadline that cannot be changed.
- Church contributions to the 403(b) pension plan will increase on January 1 to \$240 for full time pastors and \$120 for part time pastors.
- W-2s and 1099-MISC forms are due to the recipients by January 31, 2017 and the respective Federal, State or Local taxing authorities by January 31, 2017. Please refer to the specific taxing authority regulations for due dates. **All full time and part time pastors should receive a W-2 from their church.**

Due Dates: Disability Payment \$100.00 due Jan. 16
Annual Statistical Reports due Jan. 25
Workers Compensation Insurance information due 30 days after receipt
Pastor's Compensation forms due Jan. 16

- Please see the 2017 Treasurer's Guide located on www.eccenter.com, for additional due dates, current amounts due and ministry fund and camp funding percentages.
- Remember to add the following phrase (or something close to it) to all tax deductible giving receipts issued by a church or ministry, "No goods or services were exchanged for these contributions or they consisted of an intangible religious benefit." All year end contributions to a church must be received at the church on December 31 or have a postmark of December 31 or earlier. Electronic giving adds a layer of complexity to the year-end giving deadlines. There are extra entities involved e.g., credit card processors, banks and internet gateways, that are involved in the processing of an electronic charitable contribution that churches and donors cannot control. The amount of time from the donor making a contribution until the church receives the funds can be a couple of days to a week or more. Church treasurers should carefully review the processing statements received to note what day a contribution was processed.

IRS Guidance that has been released states that contributions made by credit card in 2016 are considered 2016 contributions, regardless if the donor does not make a payment on the credit card until 2017 or with normal credit card processing times the church does not receive the funds until 2017. The same is true for donations made via an ACH transfer. A donor that initiates an ACH transaction in 2016 with the funds debited from the donor's bank account should be counted as a 2016 donation even though, the church will not receive the funds until 2017 with normal bank processing times.

News from EVANGELICAL SEMINARY

FAQs about Evangelical Seminary and Huntington University

1. Is Evangelical Seminary merging with Huntington University?

Maybe. We're talking about it, but no decision has been made on that question by either party yet. What we have agreed to do is enter into a year of intentional collaboration—to get to know each other better and start doing some things together—beginning in January. By the end of 2017 we'll mutually decide whether to keep moving toward merger, or keep collaborating as independent institutions, or walk away from each other.

2. Is the EC Church losing its seminary?

No. The only way a merger with Huntington would work is if Evangelical continued to be the seminary of choice and the recipient of financial support from the EC Church, and we anticipate that the EC Church would want to be part of the even stronger institution that a merger would create.

We do hope, of course, to be the seminary of choice for the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, which is the founding denomination of Huntington, whether we merge or not. We've trained an awful lot of UB pastors over the years, including their current bishop, and would love to do more of that in this generation.

There's no rule that says that a seminary can't be both EC and UB at the same time. That would be a win for all groups...and for the kingdom of God.



3. What about all that money that ECs have given to the seminary through the years?

It stays here. Huntington is not asking for our property or our endowment, just our great academic programs and the people that make them work. Our plan at this point, should a merger happen, is to create a foundation to hold the property and the endowment locally for the continued support of the seminary's mission.

4. How will the EC Church be represented within the seminary if a merger takes place?

A variety of ways. We would have EC representatives on the foundation board. We are working now toward the creation of a Center for EC Studies at the seminary. We have a new dean (Jim Ehrman) who has long and deep EC roots. And we would continue to cultivate the relationship between the seminary and the church over the long haul, because it is so very good for both parties.

5. Will the seminary stay in Pennsylvania?

Yes, Huntington is interested in us in part because of our location in central Pennsylvania, not too far from the Cumberland Valley, where there are more UBs than anywhere else in the world. They want a presence in Pennsylvania, and we're already here.

Beth is an education specialist who tests, diagnoses and helps parents and teachers with an educational plan for those students who have learning needs. She is planning another trip to Mexico in March for the same purpose.

Ron had taken a medication which he has used in the past for a sore back, but evidently had unknowingly developed a severe allergy to it. He went into anaphylactic shock, and Brenda called emergency services. They were

Promised by Jesus in the Gospel accounts, progressively demonstrated throughout the book of Acts, and at the very core of Paul’s own message and ministry, **the Holy Spirit is the presence and power of God at work among us unto the redemption, reconciliation, and recreation of all things.** As those joined to Christ *by the Holy Spirit*, the Church lives as the community *of the Holy Spirit* and thus the means through which God is furthering his mission in the world *through the Holy Spirit*.

encing different kinds of “awakenings,” which call our attention back to the person and ministry of the Holy Spirit of God among us. It’s not surprising that the predominant interaction of the early church with the Spirit was for mission. Ours should be the same.

SOME CLARITY FOR OUR PASTORAL EXPECTATIONS

Several years ago, the EC Church defined the Itinerancy in the following way:

The Itinerancy is a self-disciplining body of ordained Elders who accept the priority of the cause of Christ in service to the Lord and who are committed to a lifetime of service under the authority of the EC Church.

If you are like me, you have loved the definition, but often wondered how we would fulfill its directives. I think it begins with some clarifications. The Board of Examiners within the Ministerial Development Community (MDC) conducted an exercise on what an EC pastor should know, be, do, and see. This exercise created a profile that advanced the following respective qualities for a pastor—knowledge, character, skill, and vision.

The beauty of such a profile clarifies our expectations. It creates an aspirational direction for new applicants in ministry. It provides the foundation for measuring current candidates and pastors, who are seeking completion to their education, ordination, and entrance into Itinerancy. It helps us to hold our current elders and pastors accountable to be life-long learners, seeking new ways of doing ministry, while holding to the foundational faith story from the Scriptures. In all these ways, the MDC will provide better ways of developing our ministerial personnel and clarifying one's path for ministry in the EC Church.

Our hope is that everyone who reads the statements below, whether clergy or laity, will find reason to aspire to become a better disciple of Jesus Christ, and seek to live out this calling within and beyond his or her community.

PROFILE OF AN EC PASTOR

Pastors in the EC Church must understand their own identity in Christ, as well as their calling and gifts in relation to the body of believers so that the church is engaged for the work of ministry in the 21st century. They must know how to interpret their cultural setting and properly communicate kingdom values and instructions from God's Word in order to form and lead a healthy community of believers.

They must be shaped by a character that reflects God's love in their lives through authenticity, patience, compassion, integrity, and spiritual fervor. They must participate in a disciplined life that reveals teachability, hospitality, forgiveness, and most of all, how to disciple others into these same Christ-like character traits.

They must be able to effectively communicate the faith—what it looks like and how it works—within and beyond their community of believers. They must demonstrate a disciple's life through their own ways of living the faith—serving, directing, giving, listening, learning, and laughing with others in order to cultivate and empower flourishing among the community of believers and make an impact on the greater community.

They must see God at work around them, enabling others to grasp hold of God's intentional love for them, and each person's own individual potential for ministry. They must not neglect the opportunities and threats in their midst, but rather reveal how God's kingdom intersects with the life of the church and their surrounding community.

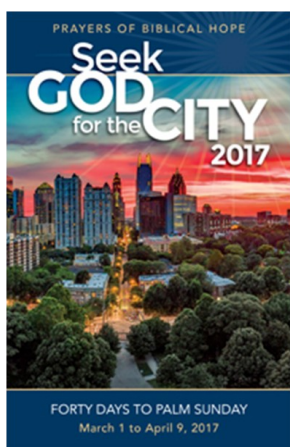
