From the Bishop

ay is the month for National Conference! That means that my days are filled with overseeing the end of stationing, the finalization of all the reports, working on the agenda, and writing the Episcopal Address. This year, in addition to all the "normal" things we do at Conference, I've been spending large amounts of time on the amendments to the Discipline, the change recommended by the Benefits Corporation, and the Covenant Implementation Team proposal which is the result of the Covenant adopted during last year's National Conference.

I could write about each of those business items here; but instead I'd like to focus on our Conference theme—COMMUNITY. That one word can be interpreted in a number of ways and will be during our days at National Conference.

The local church is a community of believers; it's not just "Jesus and me" - it's "Jesus and us." The New Testament describes the local church as a community of believers who do life together. Somewhere along

the line too many American congregations have become a collection of individuals. I pray our congregations will be more heart-to-heart focused as we care, grow, and serve with one another.

I believe there is also to be community in the denomination. It is no accident that "unity" is a part of community. The EC Discipline states, we are a connectional system "...surrendering selfsufficiency and autonomy to join together in love. Embracing our common Discipline and our common purpose-to know Christ and make Him known." May all of our districts experience a greater sense of brotherhood and new levels of cooperation.

A third aspect of community is being in community with the community around us. The Bible describes the community of believers as being incarnational. For too long the strategy of the church has been to get the people "out there" to come "in here". History has proven that doesn't work, and worse, it's not biblical. We are to be the community of God out in our communities.

We are also a global

community. There is no doubt that there are differences in the various international conferences of the Evangelical Congregational Church, like cultural distinctions. But what we celebrate is not organizational unity—it is unity in Christ. We are partners in a global community endeavoring to make disciples of all nations. Let's celebrate that!

As we come together to do some of the administrative and organizational work of the denomination and the days after; may we always remember our Savior's prayer for community— "I pray that they will all be one, just as you and I are one—as you are in me, Father, and I am in you. And may they be in us so that the world will believe you sent me." (John 17:21 NLT)


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Bishop's Top Ten Prayer & Praise

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Returning pastor revives stalled restoration effort



In January Rev. Mark Meister and three parishioners decided to take on the project of remodeling the Bethany EC Church in Sunbury. A core group of four-to-five people worked more than 500 hours since, 8 hours a day, five days a week. Materials had been purchased back in 2010, but no work had been done. They had to spent about \$200 on nails and hammers and other equipment. About \$300 of the materials we needed had already been bought in 2010, were collecting dust and, with the donation of carpeting and paint from other parishioners, the refurbished sanctuary was ready for Easter services.

One of the challenges they faced was doing repairs in a very cold church—there was no heating system. They had to use propane heaters. Rev. Meister hopes to start a fundraising campaign soon for about \$30,000 to buy an adequate heating system. To that, he'd like to add another \$10,000 to \$20,000 to make the church wheelchair accessible.

Rev. Meister served the Bethany Church from 2001 to 2007 when a personal family tragedy led to a seven-year sabbatical. When he left there were approximately 60 to 70 regular parishioners. That number fell to 12 when he started back again as pastor in January.

They now have 25. At one time they had a vibrant youth ministry of 20 to 30 kids. The plan is to contact those who used to hang out at the lighthouse café, which was located in this building.

Right now the church almost looks like the original church did. This church has been on this street corner since 1904.

Could it be that restoring the resurrection of the Son of God to its rightful place is exactly what the people of God need to give witness to the true gospel in the 21st century?



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Building Up The Church, One Shoebox at a Time

More than 80,000 churches across the United States are involved in packing gifts for Operation Christmas Child. There are just as many churches worldwide handing them out. We rejoice to hear how God is using shoebox gifts and The Greatest Journey around the world to grow congregations, strengthen evangelistic outreach, and even plant new churches.



lia. On one island, 500 children gathered at a town church for The Greatest Journey lessons and then returned to their villages to share their faith. As a result, four new churches were established, drawing new believers from a variety of religious and ethnic backgrounds. One church leader explained the evangelistic strategy: "Win one

child, win the family, and then build a church."

MOLDOVA is the poorest country in Europe and still influenced by Soviet communism. Even today, many families do not celebrate Christmas. Yet public schools welcome our church partners to hand out shoebox gifts, talk about Jesus, and teach The Greatest Journey. At one village school, Pastor Andrei Ciobanu said, "This is the beginning of a new church."

Over 70 villages in southern Moldova don't have Protestant churches. "Our goal is to get to these villages and share the Gospel," Pastor Andrei said. "Operation Christmas Child provides a big opportunity."

FIJI is an island nation in the South Pacific where Operation Christmas Child has delivered over 300,000 shoeboxes, many of them packed in Austra-

NEPAL is predominantly Hindu. Dhan Raj and his wife Sarmila are Christians who open their home daily to serve as a house church reaching out to children living on the streets of Hathmandu. They provide meals, showers, and literacy lessons, while teaching these children about Jesus. "Operation Christmas Child is our greatest tool," said Dhan Raj. "When we take gifts, they accept us." They have been able to minister to over 700 children who might never visit a church otherwise.

In one country in northern Africa we can't name for security reasons, our partners have been able to plant 19 churches over the past three years through a strategic outreach that starts with shoebox gifts.

News from Global Ministries

Nepal EC Church Leaders visit USA:

Rev. Janga and his wife Mercy have been granted visas and will be visiting with us May 20 -31, 2015. Rev. Janga and Mercy will arrive in the USA in Chicago to interact with our Illinois congregations May 20-24 and then travel to Pennsylvania to meet with the GMC India/Nepal Committee and to participate in the National Conference sessions at Messiah College May 27-29. Janga will be the speaker for the GMC luncheon at National Conference on Thursday, May 28th. Following National Conference Janga and Mercy will present the work in Nepal at Grace EC, Schuylkill Haven on Sunday morning, May 31 and at St. John's EC, Steelstown at 7:00 pm that evening.



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News from Benefits Corporation

Workers Compensation invoices have been mailed to the churches and the increase was higher than anticipated. The PA Workers Compensation Bureau increased the modification factor from 1.33 to 1.49 which resulted in a 3% increase in the premium charged to the local church. The modification factor is an amount that is added to the base workers compensation premium to adjust for claims experience. Modification factors above 1.0 signify above average claims experience. Two and three years ago there was an increase in workers compensation claims that are affecting the workers compensation rates in the current year. When we have a couple of years with no or minimal workers compensation claims then the modification factor should decrease and reduce the rates in a couple of years. We are hoping to see a decrease in the modification factor for next year. This increase only affects churches in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Maryland.

Churches not included in the denominational workers compensation group policy; Ohio, Illinois and Kentucky churches, your individual state mandates workers compensation coverage. Please confirm that all employees of the church are covered by workers compensation insurance. Per EC Benefits Corporation policy H.3.b, churches not covered by the denomination group workers compensation policy shall submit proof of workers compensation by July 1 of each year.
