A Message from Our Bishop



I don't think there is any aspect of our lives and ministries that has not been impacted by this pandemic. It truly is a historic time in our lives.

Our National Conference was scheduled to meet at Messiah College this May. That was the plan until March 30 when I received an email informing me that, because of the pandemic, Messiah College would not be able to host Conference. Our National Ministry Team (NMT), met on April 16 to talk about "Plan B." After a good conversation, the Team unanimously voted to cancel National Conference for 2020. So, what happens now?

First, most of the business that was scheduled to take place during National Conference 2020 will wait until National Conference 2021; including the election of the next Bishop of our denomination, the amendments to our Discipline, as well as, the normal items of business.

In May, the members of National Conference, that is pastors and lay delegates, will receive a packet of reports which would have been part of the normal report packet. In that packet you will find the proposed 2021 budget. Please be aware this is the proposed budget and may be changed by the NMT in October. We will be sure to share the final adopted budget, the plan for the transition in the office of Bishop and all other decisions made during the NMT meeting in October.

I am not sure when we will return to "normal." However, in some ways I pray we never do! We are living in a historic time, perhaps what some would call a "hinge point" when we change direction toward a "new normal." I cannot tell you exactly what that "new normal" will look like. But I do know, and I can assure you, that our wonderful Savior and Lord Jesus will lead us. May the Lord continue to bless his people, his church, the Evangelical Congregational Church, as we faithfully follow him and minister in his name.

Cottage Grove gets a makeover



On April 28, 2019, Cottage Grove E.C. Church of Akron, Ohio held a "Renovation Sunday" to celebrate recent improvements to their building. In the fall of 2018, proposed changes were presented in a congregational meeting. Plans were approved, and the work began in December with window replacement.

In February of 2019, the church had a "Demo Day" to remove pews and tear up carpet. This was followed by the painting crew, who put a dark varnish on ceiling arches, painted the chandeliers a matching brown, and stained the kneeling rails, pulpit, and other furniture to match. The sanctuary, nursery, foyer, men's restroom, and pastor's office all got a fresh coat of paint.

New carpet was then installed in the sanctuary, nursery, and pastor and secretary's offices. The well-worn pews were replaced with chairs.

The sound system was upgraded. More energy-efficient lighting was installed in the fellowship area and classrooms. LED bulbs were placed in the Sanctuary lights.

The special service was followed by a lunch. Sherri Sitz is Head Trustee and says she was "kind of the project manager." Pastor is Bill White, and Andrew Carr was recently appointed to the pastoral staff.



Camp ECCO celebrates 60th anniversary

On Saturday, May 25, 2019, a crowd gathered at Camp ECCO, Carrollton, Ohio to celebrate the camp's sixtieth anniversary. The event commemorated the camp's dedication, which took place on May 30, 1959.

Some came the preceding evening for a campfire, activities, and overnight stay. The day included a picnic lunch in the recently built pavilion. Following the meal, Charles Orf of Emlenton, PA, New Zion was baptized in the lake by pastor Gary Brown.

The oldest person present was Helen Dunn, age 97, of Akron, Ohio First Church. Coming in second was Rev. George Ralph, age 96, of Jupiter, Florida. He led in prayer before the meal. The youngest present was eleven-day-old Jack Elwood Fusselman, son of Weston and Alexa Fusselman of Knox, PA.

The gathering moved to the chapel, where Camp Board Chairman, Mark Reigle, described the camp's history. Bishop Bruce Hill led a service of rededication. Some of the attendees stayed into the evening.



Camp ECCO (Evangelical Congregational Camp Organization) grew out of the vision of several pastors in the early 1940's. By 1946, camps were being held on the rented grounds of Beulah Beach on western Lake Erie in Ohio. Camps were also held at Camp Otyokwah near Hocking Hills, Ohio. Leaders prayed for an E.C. camp, where they could have more freedom in scheduling and rent to other groups.

In 1958, Gene Suciu of Canton, Ohio, First Church heard that a farm was for sale near Carrollton, Ohio. The 110-acre property had lakes, wooded areas, open fields, and several small buildings. An original barn is still the center of much activity. The Western Conference purchased the land in 1959, and the first camps were held in 1961.

Bishop Harold Scanlin led the service of consecration. The first camp committee, who were to oversee maintenance and development, were elected by the Western Conference. They were pastors Paul Dunn, Bill Ring, Richard Osberg, Sr., Fred Cunningham, and Ronald Long. Laymen were Bill Carr, Roy Sipe, and Gene Suciu.

Churches unite for mutual benefit

During the last few years, Winnebago Evangelical Fellowship in Winnebago, Illinois, dwindled to a few faithful worshipers, most in their sixties. When their last pastor, Dennis Buss retired, a replacement was not immediately available. The board appointed Lay Delegate, Vivian Gaines, to schedule pulpit supplies. These included pastors, musicians, and the church's own elders.

Meanwhile, Park Hills
Evangelical Free Church of
Freeport, about 25 miles away, had
started a church in the nearby
Westlake Village subdivision. The
congregation consisted mostly of
young families. Their pastor,
Graham Boll of Dixon, grew up

near Rock River Bible Camp and accepted Christ through that ministry. Chris Stuckenberg, one of the pastors at Park Hills, lived in Westlake Village and invested time in the new church.

The young congregation was meeting in a community building, where they had to set up and tear down each week. Also, there were no spaces for children's ministries. They desired a more suitable and permanent facility. Mark Balmer, lead pastor at Park Hills, drove through Winnebago, hoping to find a possible site. He spotted the Fellowship building and wondered if a rental agreement could be worked out. Mark shared his find with fellow staff member. Rich Graham, a former E.C.'er, who was well-acquainted with Winnebago. He had worked there as an intern with Pastor Ken Schmoyer.



At the same time, a former Winnebago pastor, Gary Brown, who was at Emlenton, PA, New Zion was contemplating retirement. Gary and Rich had a casual conversation in March of 2018, when Rich came to sit with the Browns in a LaGrange hospital, where their son, Chris, was critically ill. Rich asked Gary what he wanted to do in retirement, and Gary shared his dream of returning to Winnebago. Rich described the Westlake work, and the two thought it possible the churches could benefit each other.

Gary met with Bishop Bruce Hill the following August, saying he would like to go to Winnebago to help. Bruce gave District Field Director, Dave Carr the go-ahead to speak with the Fellowship's board about Gary's interest. Dave met with them on September 4.

The following day, Rich contacted Mike Reinders, a leader in the Fellowship. The two met for lunch on September 7. As they talked about possible arrangements between the two churches, the conversation quickly turned to merger. That afternoon, Mike spoke with another leader, Paul Elsen, about the merger possibility. He then shared with the adult Sunday School class most of whom are on the board

Next, he spoke with Bishop Hill about next steps. Mike comments, "All this was with a Kingdombuilding thought process."

By fall, Park Hills staff and both congregations were moving toward merger, rather than shared space. Gary met with the staff and was offered a part-time position in Winnebago, serving with Graham Boll, who would be campus pastor. Gary planned to arrive in July.

On November 25, the two congregations came together for a morning service in Winnebago, with pulpit supply by Park Hills. They joined for worship again on December 30 and shared a potluck meal.

By January of 2019, the two groups were meeting regularly in Winnebago. Gary helped the Fellowship with the process of closing. On Palm Sunday, April 14, a dinner and service honored those who had founded Winnebago Evangelical Fellowship 40 years before, and celebrated the new work. At the end of the month, the vote to merge made it official, and Park Hills Evangelical Free Church was launched.

Bushkill church occupies new building

On March 17, 2019, the congregation of Bushkill Community Church began meeting in its first permanent location.

Since its founding in 2001, the church had met in a school cafeteria, a fire station, and other locations.

Then, they purchased the former Log Cabin Bar and Restaurant at 5504 Bushkill Falls Road, near the entrance to the Bushkill Falls tourist area. The purchase was made possible with a denominational loan and contributions from churches and individuals. With the direction of contractor, Julian Lenhart, demolition and remodeling spanned about two years.



A service of dedication was held on May 5, 2019, and neighbors were invited to a series of campfires during the summer.

Bushkill Community is the only church building in the township currently operating as a place of worship. Their worship and fellowship area accommodates around 50.

Pastor Paul Miller, who is assisted by wife, Lynda, comments, "Hope, Heal, and Help is what we're all about."

Ministry continues in Tallmadge, Ohio

In 2007, Pastor Tim and Pam Ream came from Pennsylvania to Tallmadge, Ohio to take on the restart ministry of the former Akron United E.C. Church, the merger of the Airport Chapel and Tallmadge Avenue Churches. After nearly 20 years of ministry, the congregation was struggling to continue.

While both worked at full-time jobs, Tim and Pam led the new

work, which was re-named The Community at New Direction. They were joined by Pam's parents, Skip and Judy Reinheimer, who contributed practical help. All four had worked with The Salvation Army. Committed lay people also took part.

The congregation never became large, but significant ministries were seen. Tim recalls a healing service, were individuals found needed closure. He also observed great personal growth. Pam adds, "We did a lot for the community. We were God's hands and feet. That included assisting the staff of a clinic for uninsured patients, contributing to their health with a community garden.

In late 2018, Pam's employer, Aesculap, a distributor of surgical instruments, notified her that instead of working from home, as she had been doing, she would need to move east and work in an office. She and Tim prepared to move, knowing it would mean the conclusion of New Direction.

Though much saddened, they prayed that a new ministry would take over the site. The Reams, along with Skip and Judy, moved to Center Valley, PA in December.



At the same time, a young congregation, New Hope, was praying for a facility. Led by Pastor Todd Tacket, they started as a small group, meeting on a friend's deck. They moved to a YMCA, then a cultural center.

They learned that the Tallmadge property, which includes the church, a parsonage, and grounds, was for sale. Within a few months, the congregation completed the purchase, becoming New Hope Tallmadge. Several New Direction families continue to attend.

They soon did an interior makeover and offered the community an addiction recovery program. Luke Miller is Assistant Pastor.

On July 14, 2019, the Reams began a new ministry at Bethany E.C. Church in Lehighton, PA. *Thank you to the Reams*.
