

A Rising Tide of Leadership

YOU'VE HEARD IT, I've preached it; "Everything rises and falls on leadership". The EC Church of India believes it! ECCI (EC Church of India) recently held their 50th Annual Leadership Conference with the theme, "We Are Ambassadors For Christ" from II Corinthians 5:20. This coming October the GMC is once again partnering with ECCI to host a regional missionary training event in Wangoon Manipur specifically to train the missionaries working among the Meitei people. Along with these annual training events, we also partner with ECCI's accredited training institution, Evangelical College of Theology. Our most recent partnership was to help their newly elected principal complete his PhD program in the United States. On April 3, 2017 ECT offi-

cially installed Rev. Dr. Lalrosiem Songate as their Principal. Praise God with me as you read a few excerpts from his most recent newsletter.

After completing my doctoral studies in the U.S., I returned to India and took charge of the office of Principal. The academic year soon came to an end in May and 20 students received their Bachelor of Theology and Masters of Theology degrees. It was a delight to see groups of young people stepping out of the seminary and pursuing the calling they received from the Lord....We began a new academic year on July 14 with a total enrollment of 75 students...This year sees a dramatic improvement in our enrollment and we praise the Lord for that.

EVANGERAL COLLEGE OF THEOLOGY

I want to share about two things that deeply touch my heart as I interact with prospective students during the admission process. First is the enthusiasm to study God's word exhibited by prospective students. I was specially touched by one student who told me that since the time of his childhood, to study God's word and to be involved in ministry has been his aim in life all along. There is one young student who often cried because of homesickness, yet remained steadfast to her decision to study God's word. The more I interact with this group of students, the more excited I am about this ministry!

Second, many of these students are genuinely in need of financial assistance. There is one student who told me that his brother who is selling stones as a laborer will be paying for his fees and another student told me that he is living alone with his sickly mother and has no one to support him. There are many cases of students with genuine needs. I am tempted to ask God why he is not calling rich people with lots of money to study his word. They could have easily paid for their studies, but then, this could be God's way of giving you an opportunity to be involved!



On a more tangible level, the EC
Churches in the U.S. generously responded to the need for Dr. Songate to have a sturdy vehicle that would allow him to carry out the duties of his office and to continue the much needed partnership development between the local churches, communities and individuals and Evangelical College of Theology. With great thanksgiving, the leadership of ECT has ensured us that this new vehicle will be a true blessing and encouragement to the work of the seminary for years to come.

Building The Kingdom, One Name at a Time

IN ALMOST EVERY ISSUE of Window On The World you read statistics like these from our EC Church in Nepal: Number of new converts to Christ - 45; Number of baptisms - 37; Number of new churches planted - 2. It is easy to forget that these numbers involve people with names and names are so important. Let this edited testimony from Janga's latest report illustrate my point.

A woman named Parvati was brought to the church for prayer because she was under the control of a demon for many years. We told her about Jesus who could heal her and give her new life in Christ. She was very interested in learning more about accepting the Lord as her personal Savior so we changed her name to Martha because Parvati is the name of the wife of the Hindu god, Shiva. The Devil began to torment



her, throwing her to the ground. We prayed that Jesus would free this woman from the Devil according to the Scriptures. She became unconscious and we said to the demon, "you go from this woman because she is no longer Parvati but now she is Martha and you do not have the right to trouble her because she wants to give her life to the Living God". The demon spoke through her and said, "I will not go from her, I will take her life". By the grace of God she was set free after two to





three hours of prayer and worship! Both she and her husband are now preparing for baptism in the Lord.

While we are praising God for the new names written down in glory, we are also praying for those with names who were impacted by the severe flooding in southern Nepal in August. Several homes and churches connected to our work there were either damaged or completely destroyed. We praise God that through your generosity we could send immediate relief funds that helped buy rice and provided financial assistance for those with the greatest needs. 🚇

Expanding The Mission To Latin America

WHAT A PRIVILEGE to have Rev. Elias & Myrna Martinez and Rev. Juan & Rosie Zuniga, leaders from the EC Church in Mexico travel to the U.S. to interact with our churches and join our National Conference gathering at Messiah College in May. Of course the main event was the official vote by our conference delegates to recognize that the work in Mexico had indeed matured to the point of being granted National Conference status. Now the Evangelical Congregational Church of Latin America becomes the third international mission conference to achieve national conference status. The weekend before traveling to Messiah College to attend our conference, the

leaders of Mexico spent some time with the Illinois district churches, celebrating the long relationship the Great Lakes Work Team and churches have had with our brothers and sisters in Mexico. The GMC sponsored a luncheon at the Dixon Bethel EC Church to honor Jerry & Nancy Virtue and John & Sherry Michel. These two couples pioneered the work team movement from the Great Lakes Region to the conference in Mexico in 1991.

The leaders of the EC Church of Latin America reciprocated by inviting a delegation from the U.S. EC Church to join them in their special session of Conference in July to inaugurate their new National Conference, to express their appreciation for our years of partnership and to join them in the installation of their first Superintendent (Bishop) of the National Conference. It was a joy to recognize the sacrificial work of their conference leaders, pastors and lay delegates, to celebrate the exemplary leadership of outgoing Director Rev. Elias Martinez and to help install their new Superintendent, Rev. Juan Zuniga. Following his installation Rev. Zuniga

shared the three areas of his vision for the new conference. He encouraged them to increase their involvement in missions to include Latin America; he wants to explore arranging the conference churches into districts to encourage fellowship and cooperation among the congregations and he wants to promote training of pastors and lay leaders through their Bible institute.



VBS PROJECT UPDATE:

THE 2016 VBS PROJECT funds have supported the remodeling of the previously unusable second story "patio" of Bethel Church in Rio Bravo. This new space will be used



to continue the Iglekids program that is being launched in both the EC and non-EC churches in Mexico. With the floor, wall supports and roof installed the project is 95% completed. All that's left is for the chain link fencing to be installed around the perimeter to complete the open-air, flexible facility.

Opening the Word of God To the Church



How MANY BIBLES do you have in your house? How many translations do you have access to on your smart phone, computer or tablet? What if you couldn't read any of them? Our 2017 VBS project is to help the members of the EC Church of Liberia learn to read their Bibles. Rev. Abraham Powell, Bishop of the EC Church of Liberia explains the Liberia literacy strategy below.

Brief Background:

Since ECCOL was founded in 1965, the salvation message reached many and today we have more than 5,000 poverty stricken people becoming Christians and joining the ECCOL. Of the 5,000 only about 10% are literate and 90% illiterate. What pricks my heart most is that these "illiterate" people as they are called, can speak the Bassa dialect fluently but unfortunately they cannot read nor

write what they speak thus making them disadvantaged as Christians because they cannot read the word of God that has been translated in the Bassa dialect. They only hear the word of God read by someone but they cannot read it by themselves. Hence, they are not able to quote scriptures and to lead people to the Lord by directing them in the bible to read. We are experiencing many

false teachers and preachers and as the Muslim religion is gradually spreading throughout the world, it is very much expedient that vigorous efforts be made to teach the reading of the Bassa bible to our people.

Strategy:

Two teams comprising of two persons per team will be organized, trained and sent to villages where EC churches are and will established training sessions for the members. They will train a targeted number of 500 persons in two years. The National Council will on a regular basis monitor the progress of the training. The monitoring will take into consideration, "Attendance per session, lesson taught, output and impact."

Materials and Equipment:

Two portable generators, five tape recorders, pens, pencils and copy books, assorted teaching materi-

als, Bassa bibles, one photo copier, transportation and compensation for trainers.

Expected Result:

That within 24 months period, 500 EC'ers will be able to read the Bassa bible and will

have acquired some level of skills in evangelism, thus reaching out to the lost.

Imagine the excitement that will flow through our churches and communities as more and more people read, study and share the Word of God in their own dialect! Our goal is to raise \$10,000 to help ECCOL launch the first year of this two year endeavor.

Community Evangelical Church took a short term mission trip in July to Merida, Mexico. Merida is the capital of the Yucatan Peninsula with a population of over 778,000. Our team consisted of 15 students and five adult leaders. We partnered with Christian **Endeavor (CE Mission** Weeks). Faith EC - Three students: Matt Latschar, Connor Kime, and Oliver Marvin; went to Europe with Dr. N. Sanford Good and Live 10:27 Ministries. The trip consisted of backpacking two weeks through the countries of Ireland, Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany, Austria, and Switzerland. Along the way, the full team of seventeen students conducted world view surveys that ask very intentional questions about what people believe and what they think will happen to them after they die. The data will eventu-

ally be used by Dr. Good in a publication. The survey questions are also used as a way to engage complete strangers in conversation about their beliefs and possibly open up questions about the student's beliefs. This often offers an opportunity to share the gospel with very religiously starved people of Europe. The students also handed out booklets such as The Life Book. More than a Carpenter, and The Gospel of John to those people with whom they talked. Students also looked to give a Muslim a copy of Seeking Allah,

Finding Jesus due to the rapidly growing Muslim population in Europe. Dr. Good encourages the students to intentionally seek contact information of the people they talk to and continuously stay in their lives through prayer and correspondence. This intentional investment in stranger's lives is meant to set apart the students from others, causing the individual to question what makes the student the way they are. The answer is their faith in God and love for people giving credibility to the gospel that was shared. - Rev. Joel Kime
