## Watching the Spirit Move in Liberia - by Rev. Rick Sergi

THIS WAS MY FIRST TRIP TO AFRICA and it was a long one, traveling from JFK in New York to Monrovia, Liberia. Our first day in-country was thus a "down day," in part to help us adjust to the time change. We used the opportunity to walk around the neighborhood surrounding our hotel. As we did, we passed the community well where several people were lowering pails by rope to draw water. Just beyond that, a small group (perhaps a family) were cracking rocks



with hammers to make gravel to sell by the bucket. Broken rock lay neatly in piles by the roadside, sorted by size. Across the street, two men made cinder blocks "one-at-a-time" using shovels and a form manually! We were a LONG WAY from the USA, and not just in distance!

"...for you were slain, and by your blood vou ransomed people for God from every tribe and language and people and nation..."

- REVELATION 5:9

These images and many similar ones lingered in my mind each time we gathered with our Liberian brothers and sisters through the week to celebrate God and His work of salvation. While they may have lacked in material goods or technological advances as compared to the US, they certainly DID NOT lack in their worship of God! In fervent song and dance, in heartfelt prayer, and in unending hospitality – our Liberian family demonstrated a passion for God that was overwhelming. Tears streamed from my face during one service as I thanked God for the gift of seeing, and participating, in worship of Him that was free and unhindered by circumstances.

We were here in Liberia to support the ECCOL during their Annual Conference and in their first-ever election of a Bishop. But the work of Christ does not move forward unchallenged. Behind the scenes, a breakdown in communication had fueled distrust and with it, a disunity that threatened both the conference and the church itself. "Greater (though) is He that is within us than He that is within the world!" And we were witnesses to the power of God in bringing healing and restoration to hearts that, in humility, will bow before Him. In response to the Holy Spirit's prompting, Rev. Randy Sizemore gathered the ECCOL leadership team together in a mud hut, asked for water to be brought, and then knelt down in the dirt to wash the feet of these servants of God. His modeling of the lesson of our Savior from John 13 opened the way for the Holy Spirit to minister. Hearts broke and healing flowed. Forgiveness was asked for and received and what the enemy desired to use for evil, God redeemed for good! Oh may the lesson we revisited here in Liberia ever be upon the hearts of all of us as we seek to further His kingdom and His name. And may the attitude which was in Christ Jesus, that took Him from heaven to the role of suffering servant, be that which is found in us! To Him be all the glory! @

IT IS TERRIBLE AND FRIGHTENING to be forgotten


- especially in times of difficulty. Knowing this, God works in the hearts and minds of His family that some would remember, and in that remembrance, bring encouragement and hope throughout that time of need. Such has been my experience regarding our brothers and sisters of the EC Church of Liberia. In fact, the beginning of Paul's letter to the Philippians is a good summary statement of my growing relationship with Liberia.

<sup>1</sup> Paul and Timothy, bond-servants of Christ Jesus, to all the saints in Christ Jesus who are in Philippi, including the overseers and deacons: <sup>2</sup> Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>3</sup> I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, <sup>4</sup> always offering prayer with joy in my every prayer for you all, <sup>5</sup> in view of your participation in the gospel from the first day until now. <sup>6</sup> For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus. (Philippians 1:1–6 NASB95)

Until recently, I had never set foot on the African continent nor had much interaction with the Liberian leadership team, but the Holy Spirit has burdened me for their difficulty in surviving three civil wars and the Ebola pandemic. I questioned, "What would you have me do in the face of such overwhelming difficulties and need?" He responded (figuratively) as to the disciples of old when faced with feeding the five thousand, "What's in your lunch box?" Not having a lunch box I looked around and said, "How about a bicycle?" "That is enough" He said. "Get on it and ride for Liberia." So I did.

God raised up two larger teams in 2008 and Steve in 2015 who rode with me, along with a host of supporters who gave over \$40,000 to help meet needs in Liberia. I trust there was also a multiplication of prayers on their behalf to persevere in their trust and walk with the Lord. Never did I dream that an opportunity would arise to travel to Liberia and personally experience the fruit of acting on that burden, but that reality came to fruition in January 2016.

I am blessed to report- though difficulties still abound in education, infrastructure, and economics - the church is alive and well. They are moving toward becoming a National Conference and desire to be used of God in helping to heal and bring hope to a nation still reeling from the devastation of past decades.

## Serving the Lord in Uniform

The Chaplaincy Committee served under the Leadership Commission for many years. As of July 1st, with the restructuring of our denomination, it will fall under Global Ministries. We thought you would want to know who these folks are and what they do. – Editor

#### THE CHAPLAINCY COMMITTEE Was

established by the EC Church as part of the Leadership Commission to endorse chaplains and specialized counselors in ministry. The Chaplain Committee members are primarily pastors who have served as chaplains or counselors in the past and are appointed by the Chairman, and approved by the Bishop. They serve to discuss relevant issues in chaplaincy, recommend policy, promote the chaplaincy within the denomination and serve to evaluate candidates for chaplaincy.

**Endorsement** is an official act of the EC Endorsing Agent and the committee on behalf of the EC Church to verify to any

Federal agency that the person applying to be a chaplain is fully qualified, competent to serve that agency and in good standing with the denomination. This is codified in an official document or letter.

Endorsement is required for **full-time** military and VA Chaplaincy, as well as for serving in the Reserves or National **Guard**. Endorsement by the Chaplaincy Committee is valid for one year; it can be renewed at the end of each year. It is the responsibility of the chaplain to request an endorsement. Those who are endorsed for chaplaincy will be required at a minimum to submit annual reports to the Endorser and the Bishop. The denomination can revoke a chaplain's endorsement at any time if necessary due to any of the following reasons: (1) the chaplain decides to change denominations, (2) the chaplain violates the beliefs or moral practices of the endorsing denomination, or is convicted of a crime or misconduct by the service, (3) the chaplain leaves the service organization, (4) the chaplain is needed by the denomination to serve a parish at home.

Those serving a full-time position as chaplain in a school or nursing home

**or hospital** may or may not need to be officially endorsed depending on the hiring organization. They do need to be approved by the Bishop.

Those applying to a **Chaplain Candidate Program** offered by any of the service branches need the approval of (1) the Chaplaincy Committee, which evaluates fitness and qualification for military or VA service, (2) the Pastoral Assessment Center, which verifies an individual's or couple's calling to ministry, and (3) the Conference Relations Committee, which examines doctrinal beliefs and faith practice to ensure compatibility with EC doctrine and practice.

Persons serving in a **part-time**, **voluntary chaplain position** such as with a police force, fire company, prison, or other organization or business do not need an endorsement, though they may require approval by the denomination or the Bishop.

Rev. Dana Logan, BCC, is endorsed by the denomination to serve as Director of Pastoral Services at Stone Ridge Campus in Myerstown, PA.

The difference between a pastor and a chaplain. Chaplaincy Committee seeks out, evaluates and sends out exemplary pastors and seminary students to serve as chaplains representing the EC Church for the U.S. military branches, Veterans Affairs hospitals, federal correctional institutions or schools and businesses. Although the settings may be different, federal chaplains have many of the same responsibilities as other church pastors: preaching the Gospel, leading worship, administering the sacraments, performing weddings, burying the dead, counseling, and teaching. A pastor's ministry is primarily church based; a chaplain's is community based. A simple definition of a chaplain is "a minister in a specific workplace." Military and VA chaplains exist first and foremost "to perform or provide for the free exercise of religion." Because of the unique settings of their agencies, they carry out their ministry immersed in the everyday world of military members; patients, family and staff at hospitals; and correctional officers and workers at prisons. Another difference is that pastors serve people of the same faith, whereas chaplains are responsible to see that the religious needs of people of all faiths are met, including those with no faith.

Pastors and chaplains are not in competition with one another. They are each called to different types of ministry, and complement one another. Chaplains frequently minister to people who may not set foot in a church. We should give thanks to God for our pastors and our chaplains.

## Seeing the Fruit of the Harvest

A FEW DAYS AGO I was standing by the water cooler at the language center in Thailand where we have been working, listening to two Bru friends conversing.

One is a seminary graduate and pastor;



one is a university graduate and translator for a related language group. They were discussing our plan to leave Asia in a couple more months and commenting on how different things would have been for the Bru if we had not come. They realize that having their language in writing and having the Word of God in their language is something other groups working here at the center do not have.

As I walked away I realized that both of these men are spiritual children or grandchildren of ours. And they are not the only ones. Last month a pastor in the village where we lived in Vietnam came to see us and thank us for what we had done for the Bru. His father sold us our first village house. My co-adviser on the Doca translation project - the project I'm currently helping with - is the granddaughter of our first Bru literacy student who was also our first translation helper. She was one of the

main translators of the Bru Old Testament and went on to learn the Doca language so she could help translate the Word of God into that language.

Her grandfather was one of the first

to spread the gospel to the Bru in Laos. When he crossed the river to visit us in Thailand thirty years after we left Vietnam, he brought with him a wellworn copy of the New Testament. He'd been told not to bring any papers, but when we questioned him he explained, "It's my food. I couldn't leave without it."

A few months ago, a student from Malaysia studying ethno-arts in Thailand was excited to meet our granddaughter Leah, who is a Bible translator in training there. "Your grandparents were the mentors of my mentor," she told Leah.

A surprise visit from her mentor while we were there visiting brought an opportunity to recall how God had led during those years in Malaysia. These are only a few of the blessings of having spent fifty-five years in Asia.

John joined Wycliffe Bible Translators in 1957 and arrived in Vietnam two years

later in March 1959 after traveling more than a month on a cargo ship. I joined him two years later in June 1961, and we were married in Saigon the following month. His home church, Seibert EC, was one of our main supporters, and they and other EC churches have continued to support us faithfully through all the years since then. Fellow missionaries commented on how the EC church took a personal interest in those it supported, and the Spend-a-Day program which linked us up to praying friends was something they envied.

The war years in Vietnam were filled with uncertainty and disruption, but the work continued. Our Bru teacher trainees took it upon themselves to see that we were never without language help, despite the cost to them and their families. When we were captured by the North Vietnamese in 1975, several of our Bru friends headed for the coast, sure that we would have escaped. "We weren't yet finished translating God's Word," they told friends of ours who met them there. But despite the fact that the manuscripts were taken away from us when

we were released almost eight months later, we found that co-workers had taken out older versions and we were able to see the printed Bru New Testament in 1981.

During the post-war years our focus shifted to

Sabah, Malaysia where we were engaged in language survey, administration, and work with the Kadazan people in

language learning, literature development and translation. Then in 1991 we moved to Thailand to do language survey in the Northeast, to teach at a Thai university, and to serve as administrators for SIL programs throughout the region. Service with the International Board of SIL took us all over the world in the years between 1999 and 2008.

A visit to Vietnam in 2006 allowed us to meet again with Bru friends after thirty years of almost no contact. It was a visit full of tears as well as laughter. The years had been extremely difficult for the believers. We laughed through the tears as one friend echoed Simeon's words: "Now, Lord,... you may let your servant go in peace. We have seen Grandfather and Grandmother again." The New Testament was out of print for the third time, and we wondered about reprinting. They agreed to help as much as they could, and suggested some changes. They then asked if we would help to translate the Old Testament. Miss C, granddaughter of our first translation helper, went back and forth between Thailand and the two neighboring countries where the Bru live, helping to coordinate some changes, and the New Testament plus Psalms was printed in 2009. To our great surprise, permission was given to print the volume in Vietnam, the first minority-language Scriptures printed without the national language included. A few years later, a dramatic recording of the whole New Testament was produced.

A visit to Thailand in the 90s at the request of personnel from another mission caused us to explore the possibility of using the Bru Bible to reach other closely-

related languages, and a center was set up in NE Thailand to reach out to languages related to Bru in the region. Under sponsorship of Wycliffe Thailand the center has fostered language development, literacy and translation for eleven closely-related languages. I have been involved in three of these projects. Ongoing work with the Bru as well, has involved literacy materials, Bible study materials, and a dictionary project.

In December 2014 the whole Bible was printed in Vietnam by the Bible Society of Vietnam. Although it was printed with permission from the government, the concern that the presence of outsiders at the dedication ceremony would bring negative repercussions from government security personnel caused the Bru leaders to limit attendance. Though we were not able to attend the dedication, the photos taken by others reflected the joy of those who had waited so long to receive this book. The church among the Bru has grown to several thousand believers and now has a growing number of trained pastors. The church among the

other closely related groups is newer and smaller, but dynamic and growing. Jealousies, divisions, and false teaching continue to be used by the Evil One to try to destroy the Church, but God continues to confirm his power through healings and deliverances. Only as these groups grow in their knowledge of and commitment

to the Word can they stand firm.

It has been a great privilege and blessing to have been both witnesses to and participants in It has been our privilege to share these same "endless treasures" with people groups of SE Asia.

what God has been doing in SE Asia over the last fifty-plus years. We feel the same sense of privilege the Apostle Paul felt when he told the Ephesian believers, "Though I am the least deserving of all God's people, he graciously gave me the privilege of telling the Gentiles about the endless treasures available to them in Christ." (EPH. 3:9) It has been our privilege to share these same "endless treasures" with people groups of SE Asia.

## 2016 VBS PROJECT

Our project this year is to **HELP OUR EC CHURCHES IN MEXICO** with their outreach to the community, specifically children. Our field leader Elias Martinez and his wife Myrna have developed a pilot children's outreach program to combat the large numbers of marginalized children on the streets of Mexico, often targeted by organized crime and local gangs. This pilot program called IGLEKids (Church Kids) is now being implemented in other local EC congregations and also in non-EC congregations. The goal is to help provide a safe place for the children to be engaged with the Good News and for the ongoing development of this program.

THE 2016 GMC/VBS PROJECT HOPES TO RAISE \$10,000. Our offerings would help to put a roof and chain link fence around an existing patio area owned by the Bethel Church in Rio Bravo. This "safe space" would then be used by the kids program and as a space to train other congregations in the program.

THIS STATEMENT FROM Rev. Elias Martinez, Director of the EC Church of Mexico during one of our phone conversations continues to ring in my ears and my heart. The pastoral couples, lay leaders and members of the EC congregations in Mexico continue to grow and mature into a self-governing, self-supporting and self-propagating national conference as they share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with their friends, neighbors and countrymen. Their yearlong intensive personal and professional development courses offered for pastors and spouses called, "Transforming Ministers" concluded in 2015. This year the pastors are implementing the lessons and strategies learned in their own local congregations.

Elias and his wife Myrna have developed a pilot children's outreach program to combat the large numbers of marginalized children on the streets of Mexico, often targeted by organized crime and local gangs. This pilot program called IGLEKids (Church Kids) is now being implemented in other local EC congregations and also

in non-EC congregations. The 2016 GMC VBS project will be to help provide a safe place for the children to be engaged with the Good News and for the ongoing development of this program. The construction of the newest local church, Casa De Dios in Rio Bravo continues with great enthusiasm. While most of the funds and labor for this project have been from the EC Church of Mexico, the GMC is helping with some specifics. Last year we helped with the roof and this March the GMC Great Lakes Work Team is sending a specialized team of men to assist with the electrical needs. We praise God for all He is doing in and through our brothers and sisters in Mexico! @

THE COUNTRY OF NEPAL continues to struggle with rebuilding after the April 2015 earthquake. Even as I write this update Nepal continues to experience after- shocks and earthquakes. Along with rebuilding the physical aspects of the country, they are also trying to implement the new Constitution which allows more religious freedom. This has caused some other issues such as general work strikes and opponents of the religious freedom in India responding by not sending in much-needed supplies to Nepal. This uncertainty is also directly affecting Janga's ability to begin construction on the Mercy Home/Church Center. In spite of these obstacles, the EC Church of Nepal continues to reach the Nepalese with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In 2015 Janga reports 194 new converts and 156 baptisms. They established three new fellowships or church plants. Construction continued on existing churches and after eight years of riding motorcycles, we finally were able to help Janga with a vehicle to facilitate transportation! Janga plans to hold a VBS program once again in October and his vision is to establish five new local fellowships in 2016.

THE EC CHURCH OF INDIA is comprised of six presbyteries (conferences) which are formed along tribal/language lines that work together to accomplish the mission of the Church. The Global Ministries Commission partners with ECCI in the areas of training and mission. Speaking of mission, an "ECCI Key Leaders" Consultation" was held on October 27-28. 2015 involving local, regional and national church leaders who gathered to deal with the current and future challenges and issues facing the EC Church of India. The follow up reports from this summit continue to be encouraging. In order to communicate their intentions as a

unified conference, they drafted a Covenant to guide their progress forward which includes strengthening the Evangelical College of Theology, networking with other like-minded churches, developing deeper fellowship among the conference churches, affirming and mobilizing their existing youth and women's ministries, and doing what is needed to reach the next generation with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We congratulate the leadership of Rev. L.B. Angam and offer our prayers for him and the EC Church of India as his term as General Director comes to an end. A new General Director will be elected at the April 2016 General Conference.

when tomoyuki & Jessica returned from their visit to the USA last year they started English classes with missionaries Tim & Wakako Clark which opened up many contacts. Along with these classes they are also utilizing American and French cooking classes, in addition to the Alpha courses to reach into the community with the Gospel. Under their leadership the Fuchinobe Community Church is focused on going deeper and building a larger core group as they continue to seek direction for a more permanent facility for the ministry.

Church planters Yoriyoshi and Emiko are praising God that a family member accepted Christ and was baptized just four days before he passed away at the age of 84. Yoriyoshi and Emiko were very involved in the recent Billy Graham Crusade held in Japan and Yoriyoshi was privileged to pray for Franklin Graham before he spoke to the crowd in Tokyo. The "Celebration of Love" crusade held in Tokyo November 20-22, 2015 drew more than 38,000 people with about 1,400 responding to the Gospel. Preparing for



the Crusade as an office staff manager assisting the pastors, gave Yoriyoshi and Emiko many more connections and contacts in Japan. Emiko has also been doing outdoor evangelism by performing at the train stations. She also gave a gospel concert on November 28th at a café and a Christmas concert for those who come to their international gatherings. Pastor Sudo of Kyodo Grace is taking leadership training courses as well as fasting and praying to find God's vision for the church and community. One of their new outreach strategies is centered around their ongoing music ministry to the community. Along with being our newest church planters, Yoriyoshi & Emiko also help at Kyodo Grace by leading a monthly youth gathering.

Sagamihara Chapel was also involved in the Graham Crusade. Two church members are getting ready for baptism; their family members have been coming as well. Chairman of the EC Church of Japan, Rev. Nobuo Abe continues to be involved with disaster relief in northern Japan where the tsunami devastated so



much land. In mid-September the church had an exhibit by a Christian artist who was able to give his testimony. Keiko's mothers-and-children ministry has about 10 adults and 8-9 children coming together for prayer and then walking to the park for outreach. Another aspect to this ministry has the children attend a nursery class while Nobuo shares with the mothers. Keiko was excited to invite the mothers and children in the classes to the children's event during the crusade.
