
National Conference 2025 May 21 through 23 at Messiah University

Thanks to everyone who has returned the Worker's Compensation audit forms in a timely manner. The audit is currently in process, and we hope to have a final bill from Church Mutual soon. Like many insurance policies, I anticipate an increase in the worker's compensation premium. I am hoping the increase will be less than 10%, but I do not have much faith that it will be less than a 10% increase. We get questions from time to time on completing a workers' compensation claim. The process is not complicated, but it is confusing since claims are not filed often. Each church is responsible for filing their own claims at the time of the incident or shortly thereafter. The easiest method is to use Church Mutual's online claim reporting portal, File a Claim | Church Mutual. Fill out the claim form with the best information available; the employer is the local EC church. Each EC church in Pennsylvania and New Jersey is listed on the policy, and the policy number is 07-174436. Please call with any questions.

Churches not included in the denominational worker's compensation group policy - those in Ohio, Illinois and Kentucky - your individual state mandates worker's compensation coverage. Please confirm that all employees of the

church are covered by worker's compensation insurance. Per EC Benefits Corporation policy H.3.b, churches not covered by the denomination group worker's compensation policy shall submit proof of worker's compensation coverage by July 1 of each year. The annual disability premium was due January 15, and the Benefits Corporation administrative fee is due by April 15, 2025; retirees are not subject to the administrative fee. Both of these fees are listed in the Treasurer's Guide available on the EC website. Many have remitted the disability fee in a timely manner, and a few have already submitted the administrative fee; we thank you for your diligence and hard work.

Treasurers, please confirm that you are remitting your ministry fund payments on the correct monthly form. Although, for 2025 the ministry fund percentage remained at 5.65%, it is easier on us to have the correct form submitted. We have implemented a process to accept ministry fund payments electronically. Electronic payments are not mandatory. If you are interested in remitting your ministry fund payments electronically please contact, Kevin Henry, khenry@eccenter.com. I can explain the process to you.

To date, about 60% of pastoral compensation forms have been returned. Thanks to all the churches that have responded. We will be reminding non-compliant churches to complete and submit their pastoral compensation forms. Please save Bethany White some work by submitting your pastoral compensation forms as soon as possible.

Pastors, Take Care of Yourselves

Dear Pastors and Church Leaders,

Thank you for all you do on behalf of your congregation. As Matt Schmucker wrote on the *9marks.org* website (February 26, 2010), "The role of pastor-preacher, if done faithfully, is one of the most taxing jobs in the world. It demands so many skills. It's emotionally taxing. And it's both so regular (that sermon is coming!) and so variable (who can predict funerals, illnesses, or member crises?)" But we answered a sacred calling which we take seriously and can, unfortunately, find it difficult to admit that we need help. Ministry, however, is not a good place to show our independent streak. The Church Health Community encourages pastors to maintain their health in three areas: Body, Mind and Spirit.

To keep our physical bodies functioning, we know that we should eat well, get enough rest and follow prescribed health regimens, as necessary. I recently spoke with someone who had been prescribed a ten-day course of antibiotics for an easily treatable infection. Unfortunately, he stopped after two days because he did not like some of the side effects, and the infection came back, with a vengeance. His medication non-compliance cost him time away from work, his family and the church. Likewise, we sometimes do not rest enough or take the time to exercise or spend silent time with the Lord, but non-compliance in these areas can also lead to something worse. *Soulshepherding.org* recently published the following statistics about pastor's well-being: 75% of pastors report being "extremely stressed" or "highly stressed," 90% work between 55 to 75 hours per week and 90% feel fatigued and worn-out every week. Ministry is hard. As my wife often says, "If it was easy, anyone could do it."

To maintain our emotional health, counseling can be a great resource. Our referrals to ServingLeaders have born fruit in the lives and ministries of some of our pastors, and we trust this group will continue to do so. Developing a healthy rhythm of rest, study, sabbath observation, exercise and recreation can bear fruit in unexpected, but demonstrable, ways. One of the ways we can run the marathon of ministry more effectively is to consider a

sabbatical. As Schmucker (9marks.org) writes, "Sabbaticals are not vacations. We would encourage the pastor to see vacations as time completely away from his regular work (and geography, if financially affordable) and with the focus aimed squarely on his family. Sabbaticals on the other hand are not work-less and not aimed at the benefit of his family. They are specifically aimed at reinvigorating and renewing the mind and heart of the pastor through research, purposeful travel, writing, etc." Let us know how we can help you or your board or ministry council better understand the benefits, not just to the pastor and his family, but to the church as a whole.


When we are suffering physically, emotionally or spiritually, our whole being gets "out of whack." One counseling method I have used for years has proved quite useful. Take a blank piece of paper, turn it to landscape orientation (horizontal) and divide it into three columns. Label the columns Body, Mind and Spirit. Then make a list of things which you know are beneficial for you in each area. For example: a salad for lunch instead of a burger (body), an evening walk with your wife (mind), or reading a Christian leadership book by an author with whom you suspect you disagree (spirit). Then be sure to do at least one thing in each category every day. Remember, your


ministry position is one of the most challenging there is, but also one to which God has called you. Sound biblical stewardship can help you run the race well, and the Church Health Community is here to help.

Prayer Focus on our Heroes - Our Chaplains

Over the last year we have focused on EC Chaplains serving in fire departments, hospice, military, VA, etc. This month we want to look at the work of one of our pastors, Rev. Keith Miller, who served the denomination in churches at Trappe and Lancaster Faith, then at EC Church Center as the Director of Church Ministries and Director of National Ministries and finally at the Brownstown church before retiring. He also served as chaplain for a local police force for 20 years.

While Rev. Miller has been out of police chaplaincy for a number of years, we want to express appreciation for the time of service he gave and look at another area of EC Chaplaincy. Police chaplaincy was not an area he sought out, but the Lord led him into this service by opening the opportunity. He shared the following words regarding his chaplaincy work.

I got started when the Chief of Police (Jake Glick) for East Lampeter Township asked me if I would be willing to volunteer some time and effort to working with the men on the force. Chief Glick was a member of Faith EC Church in Lancaster while I was pastoring there – that's how I got to know him.

There were not any assigned or specific tasks or duties he wanted me to do, so I sort of created my own role. I began in 1980 and served for the next 20 years until 2000 when I moved out of the area. I thought and prayed about how I could minister to these men and women whose jobs created more than enough stress in their lives. Slowly learning who they were and what was involved with their work, I began to assist in the hiring of officers and was able to do leadership training using some of the tools I used in ministry. I would often ride along with them during their midnight shifts (I did have a day job) and got to know many of them as I spent time with them during their shifts. I must admit that some of it was quite exciting – running through the snow catching a teenager who tried to run away from us



(I was much younger then), driving down Route 23 in Leola at 90 miles an hour chasing a speeder, driving a police car and actually pulling someone over with the lights flashing and carrying a night stick into a pizza place where a fight had broken out. I never made any arrests, that was the officer's job, but it was exciting, nonetheless.

There were also many difficult and sad times. Watching the ways the stress affected the officers, talking to a father that had just lost his wife and three young children in a trailer fire and going with officers at all hours of the morning to inform parents that their son or daughter was in an accident or overdosed and didn't survive were just some of them.

Spending time with them was essential. I was able to develop a closeness with many of them. For some, I had the privilege of doing marriage counseling and then officiating at their wedding. For others, I was privileged to share

about God's goodness and prayed with them for protection, for family illnesses and many other concerns they shared. All in all, it was a rewarding ministry to a needed group of men and women – to those who daily lived on the edge by not knowing what each day and experience would bring.

Times have changed and it may not be quite as easy to get involved in law enforcement chaplaincy as it was for me – I was simply asked to do it and had no training. That was over 40 years ago. But, maybe God wants to use you to touch a specific group of men and women who need someone to walk alongside them. They might need you; they might need Jesus!

Thanks, Rev. Miller, for your service, the article and the many lives you touched.

As always, the EC Chaplaincy Committee is here to support our chaplains and their work as they seek to touch lives for the Lord.


