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## Strategy v. Culture

"Culture eats strategy for breakfast." - Peter Drucker

I am sure we have all got a list of restaurant horror stories. Remember that place where your feet stuck to the floor, and where the server seemed too busy with other things to take your order? Even when the food came out, it was mediocre at best: lukewarm, poorly seasoned, unappetizing in appearance. You decided right away to never go back there because there are other options in the area. One negative experience is all it usually takes to make that decision.

Contrast that place with your local Chick-fil-A restaurant. It is always clean, always friendly, always a pleasant experience. The culture of Chick-fil-A is the reason. As is published on their website, *"Whether greeting you at the drive-thru or making your meal inside the restaurant, Chick-fil-A*® *Team Members strive to serve up memorable experiences for each and every guest. And we hope that dining with us inspires you to spread that sense of warmth to others, too."* You are called by name when your order is ready, and it is always their pleasure to serve you. The food is good, but the atmosphere (culture) in which it is served makes it taste even better. All the employees are trained in the corporate culture and values, and it is no wonder that Chick-fil-A restaurants earn dramatically more per restaurant than the competition. Around here, the drive-thru is busy almost all day. The parking lot is always busy, and the restaurant is always humming. When you drive by another place to eat, and the parking lot is empty, your first thought is not that it must be a really good restaurant. Rather, you may assume that there is a reason no one is there.

Like in a restaurant, the culture of a church is immediately apparent to those who walk through the doors. When guests feel welcome and appreciated; when it feels like people care and the experience is positive, they are more likely to come again. Thom Rainer's short book, *Becoming a Welcoming Church*, can offer some valuable insights on the guest culture of the congregation. When the culture feels like the church is a small group of insiders, it can be much harder for guests (notice we are not referring to them as visitors) to picture themselves fitting in. Ed Stetzer

and Mike Dodson call this the "Us Four and No More" church (*Comeback Churches*, B&H, 2007). They say those churches "have determined that if they get any larger, they will lose their sweet fellowship. They do not intentionally reject 'new' people, but their present relationships are so intimate that any new attendee of the church cannot break into the group. They want a family feel which means a group small enough to relate like a family."

Shifting the culture of a church can be difficult, but it is possible. Stetzer and Dodson say there are two things which stand in the way. "First, most churches will not admit how bad it is. Second, most churches will not make the needed changes."

The Church Health Community would like to encourage you to assess the culture of the church. Is it a place where guests have a great experience about which they are excited to tell their friends or would they likely give the service a bad review? The Church Health Checkup can be a good place to start in seeing how things are going in your church. Just go to the Church Health Community page on the EC website and print as many copies as you need. We are happy to help you understand and respond to the results if you would like. As you complete the Checkup, try to look at your church through the eyes of a first-time guest. What will they see, feel, smell and perceive which those who have been there for a long time may no longer notice? Is the culture inward-focused or guest-friendly? What might change if our church culture was more like Chick-fil-A's: "Whether greeting you at the drive-thru or making your meal inside the restaurant, Chick-fil-A® Team Members strive to serve up memorable experiences for each and every guest. And we hope that dining with us inspires you to spread that sense of warmth to others, too?"

# **Discipleship Multiplication Cohorts**

During the Kingdom Extension Community report at May's National Conference, I talked about discipleship multiplication cohorts that would begin this fall. This article will explain the purpose, function and details of those cohorts so you can make an informed decision for you and your church about making a commitment to the multiplication process.

Who should consider a Discipleship Cohort? Any pastor or church who is frustrated with the attractional model of ministry; who wants to clarify the process of disciple-making; who would like to work with a team of like-minded church leaders to help churches fulfill the Great Commission; or who wants to connect with an accountability circle to follow through with discipleship multiplication should consider a Discipleship Cohort.

**Why Cohorts?** Most of us have been to conferences, retreats or presentations that struck a chord in our hearts. What was being presented rung true inside, resonating with us that we need to go that direction. Then when we walked away from the event, nothing really changes. The idea of a cohort is to both learn the concept of a discipleship pathway and to walk with a group to develop a plan and then hold each other accountable to application and follow-through. The cohort will help put feet to the plan.

What is a Pathway? Every pastor and most followers of Christ could recognize and defend the importance of making disciples, even making disciples who make disciples. The difficulty most churches run into is having a solid plan to follow that can be easily replicated in each consecutive generation of Jesus followers. Together, we will develop a discipleship pathway unique to your context that can help someone walk through being a disciple that has the tools to make disciples who make disciples.

What is involved in a Cohort? Cohorts will begin with a one and a half hour training Zoom call in October followed by monthly check-ins with your cohort. Each Zoom call will involve next steps in the Pathway development process and implementation, as well as reporting in and accountability on past action steps with the end goal of becoming churches who are actually reproducing disciples.

**How do I learn more or get connected to a Cohort?** New cohorts will begin in October 2025. They will be made up of four to eight pastors or church leaders. ## **Prayer Focus on our Heroes - Our Chaplains**

In addition to our military chaplains, the EC Church has been blessed with a number of civilian chaplains both appointed by the National Conference and chaplains who volunteer to give service to local organizations and facilities along with fulfilling their pastoral responsibilities. The chaplain we focus on this month has been part of the latter group.

Rev. Dr. William Stoffel (wife is Carol) started out as a high school science teacher. He became the Chair of the Science Department before retiring from the teaching profession and entering the ministry. During his teaching

career, he would be assigned two students a year that he would counsel until they graduated. A few of those students still seek his advice and now offer him continued friendship and company. After entering the ministry, he was assigned to Lawn in 2012 where he served until his retirement in 2024.

After going into the pastorate, he saw a need in the Masonic Lodge for a chaplain and volunteered. Many of the chaplains God calls and uses end up in that work because God motivated them to respond to a need. It was through a need that he said the Holy Spirit spoke to his spirit, and he responded. He said this was one type of chaplaincy, but he was also led into a different type of chaplaincy when he started to serve in the Lawn Volunteer Fire Company. He remained in this position until the Lord provided a younger man to take over.

He said that serving in the fire department gave him additional exposure to the community on a more personal level. It also gave an opportunity to the members of the fire company to get to know



him more personally. He believes that serving alongside the other volunteers with them knowing he was a pastor minimized his having to hear the improper language and jokes or to contend with other forms of conduct which has a tendency to surface from time to time.

Rev. Stoffel enjoyed his time with the fire department. He said that "going to a fire scene does tend to get one's blood pumping a bit faster and hotter, but what may be seen at a fire by the firemen (normal human beings) sometimes can be horrifying and often lingers in their minds long aft[er] the fire is put out and the men have returned to the station."

As a result of the years spent with the fire department, he still counsels many of the men he knew from the fire department. While with the fire department, he was able to share prayers and counseling sessions with distraught firemen. Sometimes he would meet with a fireman and through counseling with him, the man would reveal the cause of his anxiety or need. He believes that knowing the secret private life of any person, let alone a a fireman who is kind of a local hero, is a sacred responsibility bestowed upon all chaplains. Over time, this

personal knowledge a chaplain is privy to can have a detrimental effect on them personally, including the chaplain's well-being and moods. This is one of the root causes of chaplains burning out and quitting, he believes.

As we realize the many situations faced by our chaplains and the lasting impact those situations can make on an individual, it is a call to prayer for all chaplains and not just our EC chaplains.

Some of our EC pastors reading this are serving as a chaplain in some community organization or facility, and the Chaplaincy Committee extends their appreciation for your service, but we would like to know how and where you are serving. 
Summer is finally here! As schools let out for the summer, and the weather warms, Twin Pines is ready for summer campers to arrive.
