
The annual Treasurer's Guide and the 2026 Ministry Fund forms are now available within the Members' Section of the EC website. Additionally, the updated Pastoral Compensation forms may be accessed online. All forms are located in the designated Members' Section for your convenience.


A couple of end of the year reminders:

- Pastoral Compensation Forms should be returned to the EC Church Center by December 31, 2025.
- The Annual Statistical Report is due to the EC Church Center, 100 W Park Ave, Myerstown, PA 17067 by January 25, 2026. An Electronic Reporting option is available.
- W-2 forms for employees, including pastors, and 1099-NEC forms for independent contractors are due by January 31, 2026, to the recipient and to the respective government agency. The 1099-NEC is a newer form which replaces the 1099-MISC in most instances for churches; payments made during 2025 are to be filed by February 2, 2026. Pastors are employees of the local church and should receive a W-2 with federal, state and local taxes withheld from every paycheck.

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Breaking Inertia: Energy for Change

An object at rest tends to stay at rest. This is Newton's first law of motion, or the law of inertia, and it applies to churches as well. In churches where nothing significant has changed in decades, there tends to be greater resistance to change, therefore, inertia. Fortunately, as Newton also reminds us, an object in motion tends to stay in motion. In churches where change is normal, things tend to continually be updated and adapted. The building, practices and priorities are regularly evaluated and brought into alignment with the mission.

"We've never done it that way before," is a common point of resistance to change in the church. We hear that from churches and their leadership, even as the church is preparing to close its doors. We update things in other areas of life (technology, styles, automobiles, etc.) but refuse to do so in church. One thing we do not see is churches closing their doors forever because they were too innovative, too ready to adapt to the community or too involved in the Great Commission.

Inertia can be overcome but it takes a lot of energy. An example is the Saturn V rocket used during the Apollo missions to the moon. Fully loaded, the rocket weighed around 6.2 million pounds. In order to get it moving, the first stage of the rocket burned about 5 tons of fuel per second. The second stage burned 1.2 tons/second, and the third 0.2 tons/second. Each successive stage required less energy to keep the mission moving upward but getting the whole thing moving was a serious undertaking. In revitalizing a church, you may feel it would just take too much energy. You have tried some changes and they were met with complaints or did not seem to bear fruit. But when you get things moving, updating things along the way, you may notice that the momentum you have gained seems to make the next stage a little bit easier. The average American weighs about 181 pounds. If you have 65 people in your church, that is a total of 5.9 tons of people,

only a small fraction of a Saturn V. It will take a lot of energy to get them moving in the same direction, but the Church Health Community is here to help. Give us a call, and we will work with you to get things going.

The "Next Great Program"

I think we can all admit that sometimes leading a church can be really hard. There are so many demands on your time. People are hurting and need to be cared for. People can be messy, and dealing with the struggles in the lives of people we care for can be a strain. On top of that, you carry the burden of making sure everything is right, week after week after week - sermons, music, Sunday School classes. You make sure all of the volunteers have everything they need and pray they will all show up. Then there is the worry about how everything will go! What about visitors? Will they enjoy the service? Will the music be enough to draw them back next week? Will the sermon be engaging enough, just the right mix of humor and content and depth? Then you add on Sunday night programs, mid-week programs, special events, outreaches, holidays and all of the other opportunities to grow your church.

But the truth is, churches are not growing, most of them at least. Eighty percent of churches in America are plateaued or declining. In all likelihood, most everyone reading this is in one of those churches! We work tirelessly to change the tide, and we continue to fail. We have tried all of the next great programs. We have bought the books, gone to the seminars, heard the challenging pitches at conference. Yet, churches are still in decline.

I think most of us are done with "the next great program." We have tried them; we have recast vision and sold so many ideas to our leadership teams. We are discouraged and frustrated. We firmly believe Jesus when he said he would build his church, and the gates of hell would not prevail against it. Yet, from our perspective, it sure does feel like the gates of hell are winning right now.

Maybe the problem is the program? I am not suggesting that we just need to find the right program; a new worship leader, a new band, new lights or fog machines are not the answer to the next great program. In fact, I want to encourage you to stop looking for the next program and start looking at who and what God has given you. That is enough! God has called YOU as the pastor or leader in your church to simply equip your church, not to get enough people to run programs that will attract more people, but simply to equip your people to reach and disciple the people whom God has put in their lives. They, in turn, will be equipped and empowered to reach and disciple the people God has put in their lives. This is the church. This is the multiplication God planned for his church.

Ephesians 4 tells us, "So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ." You have been given to the church to equip the church, not to run your programs and fill roles and slots to keep the machine running, but to reach and disciple those God has brought into their lives.

They are seeing new families every week and seeing people come to know Christ and follow Him. Please pray for our Haitian brothers and sisters. Despite having legal status, there is much fear in the Haitian communities at this time with the increasing deportation measures being taken. This has impacted church attendance and participation. Pray for peace in their hearts and the ability to keep their eyes on and hope in Jesus. Please pray especially for Martial and his family. His wife and children remain in Haiti and are seeking to gain asylum to the US.

Manuel and Luz Arias – Praise the Lord!!! God has provided a church to partner with Casa de Amor to host them on Sunday afternoons and a couple of nights throughout the week. Manuel and Luz have had numerous disappointments as location opportunities have fallen through; this is a major answer to prayer. The Casa de Amor leadership team is working on plans for an official launch date and service. Pray for wisdom, strength and renewed energy for this couple. Manuel and Luz have especially asked for prayer for their family. They are considering potential changes that would allow them to devote more time to the church. ICL UPDATE

We are looking forward to our Spring 2026 courses at the EC Church's ICL!

Our first course of the semester will be "Pastoral Leadership" which will equip pastors with the tools needed to face the unique leadership challenges found within ministry. Attention will be given to both the character and skills necessary to shepherd God's people well, leading to a purposeful, effective and fulfilling pastoral ministry. Our instructor is Rev. James Price; classes will be held via Zoom on Tuesdays from January 6, 2026, through February 10, 2026, from 6:30 to 9:00 PM.

Our second course of the semester will be "Old Testament Survey" in which students will look at Old Testament literature, history, geography, culture, theology and structure to understand and communicate what the Old Testament reveals about God. This course is a great opportunity for both church leaders and lay people. Our instructor is Rev. Dr. Timothy Valentino, and classes will meet on Tuesdays beginning March 3, 2026, through April 14, 2026, from 6:30 to 9:00 PM on Zoom (with the exception of Holy Week).

The ICL (Institute for Church Leadership) offers a series of courses in Bible, theology, spiritual formation, the mission of the Kingdom, church history and more. Anyone can benefit from these opportunities for spiritual enrichment and leadership

development. Courses do not have any educational prerequisites and do not earn seminary credit. Classes are affordable as students and auditors will pay a one-time fee per class of \$250 and \$50, respectively.

Prayer Focus on our Heroes - Our Chaplains

Have you ever met a state police chaplain? If you know the Rev. Dr. Gordon Lewis, you have.

Pastor Lewis, or Gordy, as he is known, is our pastor at Faith EC in Harrisburg where he has served since his appointment in 2018. He is married to Donna, and they have two children.

Gordy, who is licensed out of Christ EC Church in Jarrettown, started pastoring as Assistant at Grace EC in Allentown in 1974 which is the year he was licensed. Since then, he has served Bair (1975), Zion in Pitman (1983), Royersford (1984), Harrisburg Trinity (1990), Conference Minister / District Field Director of the Susquehanna Region (2010). In 2014, Fishing Creek was added part-time to his duties. He was superannuated in 2016, but he continued at Fishing Creek part-time. Harrisburg Faith was added to his responsibilities in 2018. In 2023, he continued only at Harrisburg Faith part-time .



Along with his pastoral service and his Conference service as Conference Minister, he served the Pennsylvania State Police as a chaplain for 15 years, and before that, he was a policeman in Philadelphia. Although he no longer serves in this capacity, he still remembers the service he rendered.

When asked how he became involved in police chaplaincy, he said:

My interest in Police Chaplaincy began many years ago when I was a policeman in the city of Philadelphia. When I entered pastoral ministry and began my pastoral duties at Faith EC Church in Bair, PA, I had an appointment with Rev. Harold Easter, who was then the Commissioner of the West Manchester Police Department. Through his urging, I was privileged to become the chaplain for the department for a number of years.

Much later, when serving at Harrisburg Trinity in Rutherford Heights, I was talking to Rev. Allen Kline who informed me of an opportunity to become a chaplain for the Pennsylvania State Police. Following the necessary interviews and background checks, I was honored to serve as a State Police Chaplain for 15 years.

As he reflects on those years of service and what he accomplished, he said:

It afforded me many opportunities to encourage and share the love of Jesus Christ with those men and women who protected us throughout the state. Some of those opportunities included personal relationships and sharing encouragement; counseling; weddings and funerals. In addition, I was able to participate in a number of ceremonies such as new cadet classes, dedication of a new State Police barracks and even producing a video regarding the opportunities that a chaplain can offer to the State Police. The need for a chaplain really became real and authentic when having to assist in informing people of the death of loved ones (especially youth), ministering to officers who had been injured or shot in the line of duty or even dealing with spiritual issues that the officers were searching for.

1. What is your philosophy and mission for Twin Pines?

At Twin Pines, we provide an opportunity for children, youth and adults to grow as followers of Jesus in a safe, joyful, adventurous and Christ-centered community. We know camp is a powerful place where kids learn about God, build confidence, and form healthy Christian relationships. Everything we do—from activities to worship to mealtimes—is designed to equip young people to know, love, and follow Christ long after they leave camp (and change the world).

2. What do you think makes / will make Twin Pines as a camp stand apart?

Twin Pines is more than a camp, it's a sacred place where people experience God's presence in the beauty of creation and through the caring, faithful people who serve here.

From talking to former campers, staff and Camp Directors, what I have found is that what sets us apart is our commitment to nurturing **the campers to be disciples** through the mentorship by **missionaries on fire for God,** (that is, the camp staff and counselors). These young men and women love the Lord their God with all their heart, soul, mind and strength; and they love every camper with that same Christ-like devotion. They have an energy that is contagious and the campers will want to be like them.

The friendships formed here, the mentors who walk alongside the campers, and the feeling of belonging to a Christian community, these are gifts that last a lifetime, They are the greatest gift your child can receive.

And even though we're not a big camp, we live by the truth that you do not have to be big to be great. What matters most is the impact on your child's heart and faith.

3. How do you build a strong, welcoming community for children?

I believe a good community is built on **kindness**, **faith**, **and shared experiences**. Every camper is invited into a warm and inviting environment where they will be known, encouraged, and valued.

It is through the love of the Christ-centered and child-focused "on fire for God" young missionaries and camp leadership that the campers become part of the Twin Pines community.

We are also intentional in creating opportunities for children to bond and learn about Jesus. This happens through shared meals, cabin life, worship, and group activities, so they feel connected and supported. We honor the Twin Pines' traditions of the past while making sure every camper feels at home, whether it's their first year or their fifth.

Your child becomes part of a community that extends far beyond the Poconos—made up of people whose lives from all near and far have been touched by this ministry for generations.

4. What are our goals for your child's development beyond just activities?
